## Over 100 attend Cecil-Morgan reunion

Sunday, June 10, more than 100 present and former residents of the Cecil-Morgan area on Willow Creek in Morrow and Gilliam counties met at Hat Rock State Park to renew old friendships and meet new friends, announced a spokesperson for the Cecil Friendship Club which sponsored the reunion picnic.

Mrs. Henry (Dode) Krebs was master of ceremonies for a most program which recognized members of pioneer families who were present, as well as the longest continuous resident, those who served as postmaster, teachers, and school bus drivers.

Morgan and Cecil communities were among the earliest in Morrow and Gilliam counties, having been settled before the counties were organized. Cecil was along the Oregon Trail with wagon train traffic going past until after the 1900's. The Cecil post office, established in 1867, was the first post office in what was to become Morrow County. When the counties were established, the county line bisected the communities and both communities had residents in both counties.

Pioneer families represented were descendants of the following: Francis Deos, W. B. Ewing, John Lincoln Logan, P. M. Nash, W. E. Ahalt, H. O. Ely, Jack Hynd Sr., T. W. Lowe, George Krebs, Wate Crawford, Philips (first name unknown), Fred Ely, Noah Pettyjohn, Fred Pettyjohn, Ross Perry, Jobe Crabtree, A. C. Crowell, and Elmer Griffith. There were several present who were fifth generation members of these families.

The longest continuous resident present was Jim Logan, who was born at Cecil 81 years ago. The ranch he shares with his brother, John, contains the homesteads of his father, Leon, and grandfather, John Lincoln Logan.

Anne (Lowe) Krebs served as postmaster at Cecil at the time her parents owned the Cecil store. Mrs. Neil Nash (E. Mangold) served as teacher at Morgan in 1929-30. She and her husband who now reside in Lakewood, came the farthest to be present at the reunion. Mrs. Connie (Bork) Crawford taught school at Cecil from 1930-33.

To start your food preservation season off on the right foot, be sure to have the gauges for your pressure canner checked to be sure they are accurate. At this time, the nearest location for having the gauges checked is the Coast to Coast store in Hermiston. You need only take the gauge...bit the entire pressure canner.

For the best and latest information on canning, freezing, drying, or making jams, jellies, and pickles, stop by any Oregon State University Extension Office and ask for the bulletins available on the specific topic. There is a small charge for the bulletins, but they are excellent information and well worth more than their cost.

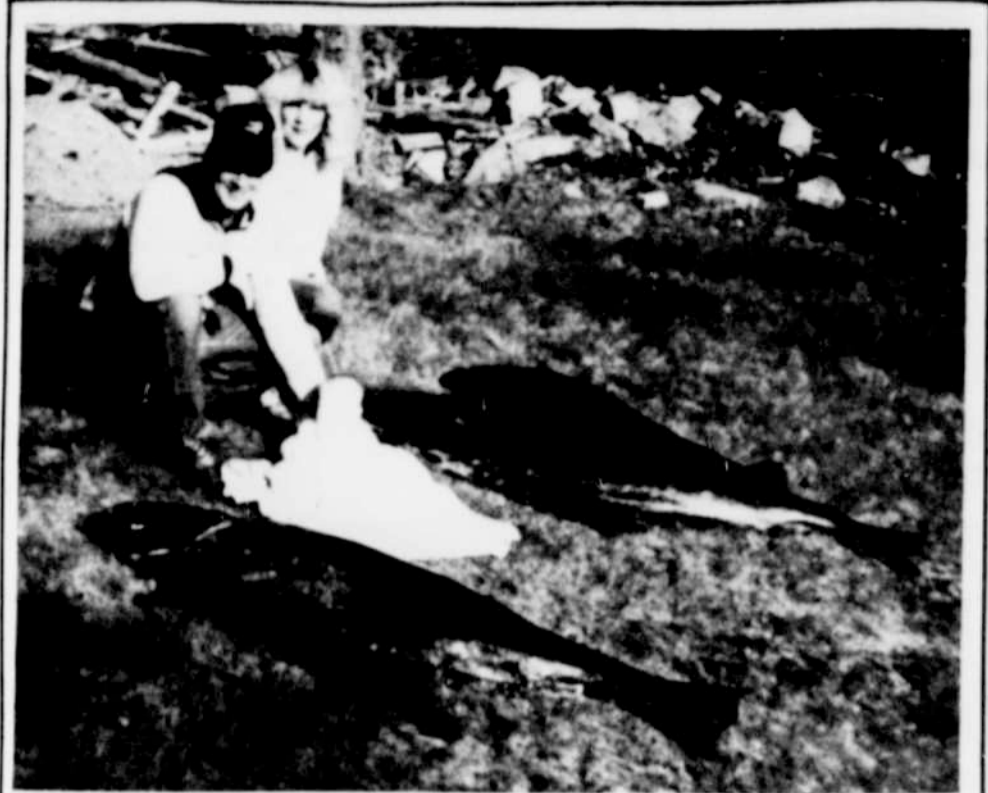
