The Morrow County Public Works Department has submitted the following road report for work done during the two week period ending July 13:

Roads bladed: Penland Lake, Sanford, Irrigon roads, Arbuckle, Shobe Canyon, Willow Creek and Little Butter Creek shoulders.

Roads patched: Rhea Creek (Ruggs up), Sand Hollow, Willow Creek (upper bad spots), and Daltzell.

Blade patch: Rhea Creek Road. Projects: Little Butter Creek shoulders cut; road broomed off; culvert extended at Pine City; pugmill roller and moved tank to job site; and moved rock stock piled for pugmill.

Shop: welded liner in Spokane tub, buried telephone line shop to office, began electrical improvements, prepared equipment for oiling, installed new pads on D-6 cat, and regular maintenance.

Crusher: setting up at Port of Morrow site and rebuilding to accommodate new routing.

Cutsforth Park: cleaning and clearing unimproved area.

North end: mowing east Irrigon roads and removing overhanging trees on Irrigon road.

D.A.'s Report

The Morrow County District Attorney's office at the Morrow County Courthouse in Heppner has handled the following Grand Jury indictments during the past week:

Nathan Ray Hammons, 30, Heppner, charged with Delivery of a Controlled Substance and Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance. He was indicted July 12 and arraigned July 16. Bail has been set at \$15,000.

James Steelman, 29, Heppner, charged on three separate indictments of Delivery of a Controlled Substance and one indictment for Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance. Bail is set at \$35,000.

Orville Laverne Smith



Orville Laverne Smith died Tuesday morning July 10, 1984 in Evergreen Hospital in Kirkland, Washington. He was 80 years old.

Smith was born September 15, 1903, in Osakis, Minnesota, the son of Lewis and Maren Sophia (Clawson) Smith. In 1909, he moved with his family to Naches, Washington, where his father owned the general store. He attended the University of Washington, then worked on a freighter from Seattle to Argentina, where he managed apple orchards and a fruit packing company for three years.

Following his return to Washington State, he married June Louise Pfeiffer of Seattle in 1932. He worked for his father in Naches for a short time, then became a partner of the Naches Lumber Company, which was sold in 1938 to Cascade Lumber Company. He then moved to Heppner, Oregon, to operate the Heppner Lumber Company, which he expanded to include mills in Pendleton, Monument, and Elgin.

During this time, he was a member of the Heppner Benevolent Protective Order of the Elks.

In 1953, he sold Heppner Pine Mills and retired, dividing his time between Seattle, as owner of Stetson-Ross Lumbering Machinery Company, and his winter home in Honolulu, Hawaii.

He was the brother of Harold Smith of Yakima, now deceased.

and is survived by his sister, Mrs. Charles Dower of Naches; his children, James L. Smith, Robyn Smith-Astaire, Catherine Schierman, and Jennifer Haakenson; and by six grandchildren.

Services were held at 2 p.m., Friday, July 13, at Acacia Memorial Chapel in Seattle with graveside services in Yakima at Terrace Heights Memorial Park at 10 a.m., Saturday, July 14.
