## AAUW sponsors Chautauqua performance in Heppner

"Armed in the Spirit, a one-act play that dramatizes the American missionary experience in the Pacific Rim, will be performed on July 31, 8 p.m. at the Heppner Elementary Gym. The play is sponsored by the Heppner-Ione branch of the American Association of University Women and the Oregon Committee for

the Humanities, as part of the touring Chautauqua '84 program.

"Armed in the Spirit" is a theatrical journey into the lives of U.S. missionaries and their impact on Pacific Rim countries. This legacy, which remains as real as the morning headline, is a complex story of good intentions meeting with frustra-

tion. It is also the story of personal sacrifice, hardship, and courage, and of moments of cultural misunderstanding that are sometimes comic, sometimes tragic.

"Armed in the Spirit" was written by Charles Deemer, resident playwright at Portland's New Rose Theatre and the author of "Christ-

mas as the Juniper Tavern," which was broadcast on Oregon public television last spring. Joining Deemer on stage are Jane Van Boskirk, a Eugene actress known throughout the Pacific Northwest for her one-woman touring shows such as "The Northwest Woman" and "Prodigal Daughters;" and Bill Douglas, a veteran actor and mime who has appeared on television ("Peyton Place" and "Death Valley Days") and film ("PT 109" and "The Interns"), as well as on stages from New York and Paris.

The swiftly paced play traces America's missionary legacy from pioneering activity in Hawaii in the early 19th century, to the long but ultimately failing effort to bring China to Christ. Unrelenting in its historical accuracy and dynamic in its theatrical form, "Armed in the Spirit" is an evening of entertaining and thought provoking theater. The play is produced by Northwest Touring Theater, which also produces Jane Van Boskirk's historical dramas.

He has received final instruction from Ritz Oikawa, state LABO-LEX

coordinator. Departure will be Saturday, July 21 at 11 a.m.

Each Oregon delegate has been assigned a host family in Japan. Each, also, has been busy studying the language and customs of Japan so their arrival and visit will be more meaningful.

Terry, one of the youngest in the delegation, will be a seventh grader in Heppner next year. He is, however, one of the better prepared for his trip as his father has taught him some of the language. In addition, he served as host brother

to a Japanese student visiting here under the same exchange program last year.

The LABO-LEX Oregon Japan exchange is an annual event with 4-H members 12-17 years of age traveling to Oregon from Japan, and Japan to Oregon. Delegates spend a month with a host family, living as a member of the family. Many lifelong friendships have been established through the program.
