Between those two dates are packed in as many entertainers, horse events, exhibits, contests and fun times as the Fairgrounds and the hours of the day can accommodate says a spokesperson for the fair. A Variety Show, coordinated by popular Country Western Star, Marty Davis, will be performed on Monday, August 6 in the Hermiston High School Stadium at 8 p.m. Tickets for this show are on sale now at the Fair Office and will be on sale at the gate also. On Tuesday and Wednesday nights wrestling will be scheduled at the High School Stadium. These tickets are also on sale now at the Fair Office.

Fair goers will be able to view the usual exhibits and contests and the Davis Amusement Carnival will be operating from Monday evening through Saturday night. Each day of Fair will be an Arm Band Day

except Thursday, which is Family Day when all rides will be reduced. Regular food concession stands will all be operating.

Local girl attends Ore. Business Week

Lana Reid, Heppner, will be among nearly 400 Oregon high school students and their teachers at the Monmouth campus of Western Oregon State College July 29-August 4, states a news release from WOSC.

Attending the fifth annual Oregon Business Week program, participants have a week long opportunity to operate businesses of their choice through computer simulation.

At the same time they are exposed to basic economic principles, key elements of Oregon's economy and career opportunities awaiting them as employers and employees of the future. Prime among their many lessons is learning the role of business in society from present leaders of businesses, large and small.

More than 150 volunteer business people serve as faculty and advisors for Oregon Business Week. They join another 350 firms, organizations and individuals purchasing \$150 scholarships providing expense-free

attendance for students and teachers.

Participants apply from public and private high schools throughout the state. Teachers also have the opportunity to receive college credit preparing to teach essentials of economics and personal finance graduation requirements.

Sponsors of the Oregon program, similar to others being offered in about 20 states, are Associated Oregon Industries Foundation, the State Department of Education, Oregon Council on Economic Education and WOSC.

In addition to their learning experience, most students receive an initial introduction to life on a small college campus. Western Oregon's many recreational and cultural facilities are available during free time.

Other highlights include mid-week visits to operating businesses and manufacturing plants in the mid-Willamette Valley region.

As they traveled southward they were met by Dode Krebs at Cecil who told them about that Oregon Trail Community; they viewed historic Wells Springs and the Ella area before continuing into Ione where they were driven around the town, but did not stop as they were running late because of their delaying bus trouble. A late luncheon stop was enjoyed at Valby Lutheran Church before they traveled on to Heppner where after viewing the dam and reservoir, they went through the courthouse and visited the county museum and the 1976 U.S. Bicentennial project, the one-room pioneer
