F. Douglas Ogletree, 69, formerly of Heppner, died Saturday, July 28, 1984 at Royale Gardens Health Care Facility.

Born September 11, 1914 in Brewton, Alabama, he came to Oregon in 1939. He worked for Kinzua Pine Milling in Wheeler County, and later was employed as an engineer by Heppner Milling Co. in Morrow County. In 1955, he moved to Brookings and purchased a share of Brookings Plywood. He later owned a Western Auto store in Brookings.

Ogletree had lived at Grants Pass since his retirement in 1972, and belonged to the Grants Pass Masonic Lodge 84, AF & AM and the Grants Pass Elks Lodge, No. 1584.

Memorial services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, August 1, at Lundberg's Chapel with the Rev. Harold George and Grants Pass Masonic Lodge officiating.

Survivors include his wife of 43 years, Beulah; brothers Raymond of Gulf Shores, Alabama, and Randolph of Brewton, Alabama; a stepson Mitchell Bell of Grants Pass; one granddaughter and one great-granddaughter.

Instead of flowers, the family suggested memorial contributions be made to the Masonic Home or the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, in care of Lundberg's Chapel, Grants Pass.

10 Years Ago

Thursday, August 8, 1974
A forest fire consumed 132 acres of timber valued at 14,000 in the Indian Creek area of Umatilla National Forest before being controlled Monday afternoon. Total cost for putting out the fire was \$42,000.

Willow Creek Dam cleared one more hurdle in its 40-odd year fight for existence last week when the U.S. Senate cleared it on a voice vote.

Police Chief Dean Gilman reported to the city council "I knew housing was tight, but I didn't know it was impossible. It is useless to continue looking for another officer, if no housing is available."

Kinzua Corporation began production of plywood at its Heppner plant.

25 Years Ago

Thursday, August 6, 1959
Telephone men were installing the last phones in Pacific Telephone's large rural project south of Heppner last week, according to manager Dallas Short. Cost of the rural telephone improvement project was estimated at \$113,500. Subscribers were changed to dial service as their phones were installed. Magneto telephones were discontinued with the changeover.

Mrs. Emma Gatewood, "the walking grandma," stopped overnight in Boardman on her way to the Centennial Exposition in Portland. She was

reported as saying that people were trying to scare her out but that after getting through Wyoming, which she considered the worst part of her travels, and getting this far, she would continue on to Portland.

50 Years Ago

Thursday, August 9, 1934
"An ordinance authorizing the city to accept the American Legion swimming tank was voted down on third reading Monday evening at the regular monthly meeting at city council. The vote was unanimous as councilmen present considered a remonstrance signed by a large number of citizens of the city as evidence of a majority sentiment against the city taking over the tank property and reconstructing it for use."

"The remonstrance stated primarily the objection of a large group of citizens to having any buildings replaced at the swimming tank because of the menace they presented in case of repetition of such a flood as occurred on May 29."

The Townsend plan for old age revolving pensions was discussed at the Lions Club meeting. "While no vote was taken on the matter by the club, and several members deemed the plan unworkable as far as they understood it, there was an expression of sentiment favoring a system of federal old age pensions."
