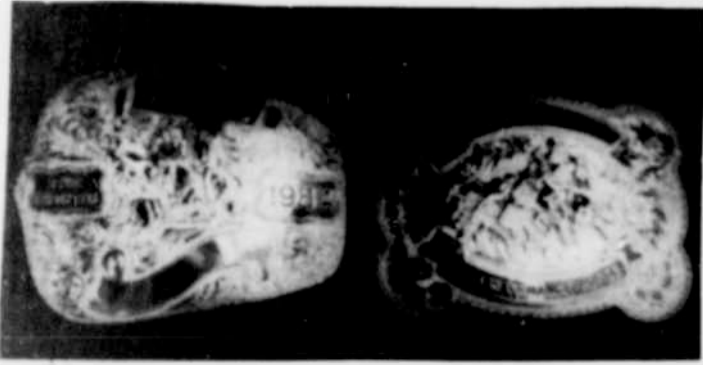


Wranglers add open class to this year's show



This year's Wranglers Morrow County Horse Show will be held Saturday, August 25, at the fairgrounds in Heppner. The horse show, which started over 25 years ago has expanded this year to include Open Class Competition.

Seventeen open class events will be featured along with 32 Morrow County classes, which are for county residents who have owned and kept their horses at least 60 days prior to the show.

Superintendent Burke O'Brien stated, "We saw the need to include open classes to increase the participants in certain events and feel the show needed to expand."

Many individuals and merchants have donated prizes. Top awards this year are belt buckles. Jim and Carlene West of Ione have donated a \$250 buckle to be given for the top junior performance. The Heppner

Elks Lodge has given a \$100 buckle which will be awarded for the top senior performance.

"If it weren't for this community involvement, we wouldn't have much of an event," O'Brien added.

The day begins at 8 a.m. with halter conformation classes. Performance events follows which will include: English, western, trail, working cow horse, and games.

The judges are Jackie Fulp of Mosier and Paula King of Grass Valley.

This year's secretaries are Sue Evans and Sharon Lewis, both of Heppner.

Entry forms may be picked up at Green Feed and Gardner's Mens Wear in Heppner and Kenny's Farm Market in Irrigon.

The Wranglers will operate concession stands during the show.

Sheriff's Dept. siezes potted pot plants

On Tuesday, August 14, the Morrow County Sheriff's Office siezed 35 marijuana plants ranging in size from four to six feet tall from a corn field in the Irrigon area stated a press release from the Morrow Co. Sheriff's office.

The Morrow County Sheriff and several deputies raided a corn field near Irrigon and confiscated 35 marijuana plants that were being grown in pots among the corn. This brings the count to date approximately 250 marijuana plants seized in the north end of the county by

Sheriff's Office personnel this year. No arrests were made at the scene but the case is under investigation. Cultivation of marijuana is a class "A" felony which is punishable by a large fine and up to 20 years in the penitentiary.

I.C.A.B.O. plans ice cream social-reunion

The Ione Community and Agri-Business Organization has had "slight" attendance at its last two meetings because many of its members are involved with harvest said John Bristow who presided at the August 8 meeting in the absence of President Chuck Starr. "We have discussed some good ideas, and now will have to firm them up and get rolling on them."

The members present discussed the possibility of an ice-cream social-reunion for the community's Morrow County Centennial Activity but not yet selected a chairperson for the event.

Several ICABO members attended the Irrigon City Council meetin August 14 and discussed port action and the possibility of a road connecting Ione with the north end of the county.

The possibility of opening a day care center in Ione was suggested and members are checking into state requirements prior to making a decision on the suggestion.

Bristow said that after harvest the organization hopes to reorganize its volunteer efforts to cleanup and tear down old buildings in the city.

The next meeting will be Wednesday, Aug. 22 at Beecher's Cafe.
