ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS  
Morrow County invites bids for Runway and Taxiway Improvements at the Morrow County Airport Lexington, Oregon.  
Specifications may be examined at the Morrow County Public Works Building, Lexington, Oregon, or at the office of Krumbin Engineering Ltd., 361 Southeast Second, Pendleton, Oregon 97801. A copy of said documents may be obtained at either office upon payment of a non-refundable twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per document. Checks are to be made payable to Krumbin Engineering, Ltd.  
Bids must be in writing, sealed, marked plainly as "Runway and Taxiway Improvements" at the Morrow County Airport, and received by Morrow County by 10:00 a.m., September 13, 1984, at which time the bids will be publicly opened and read.

Each proposal must be submitted on the prescribed form and accompanied by a certified check or bid bond payable to Morrow County, in an amount not less than five percent of the total bid amount.

A pre-bid inspection of the project will be conducted at the site at 10:00 a.m., September 6, 1984. The meeting will convene at the FBO Office at the Morrow County Airport.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a 100 percent Payment Bond and 100 percent Performance Bond in the full amount of the contract price.

The proposed contract is under the subject to Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, as amended, and to the Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) and Federal Labor Provisions.

All labor on the project shall be paid no less than the minimum wage rates established by the U.S. Secretary of Labor.

Each bidder must supply all the information required by the bid documents and specifications.

The EEO requirements, labor provisions and wage rates are included in the specifications and bid documents.

Each bidder must complete, sign and furnish with his/her bid a "Certification of Nonsegregated Facilities" and a statement entitled "Bidders Statement on Previous Contracts Subject to EEO Clause," as contained in the bid proposal.

A contractor having 50 or more employees and his/her subcontractors having 50 or more employees and who may be awarded a subcontract of \$50,000 or more, will be required to maintain an affirmative action program, the standards for which are contained in the specifications.

Where the bid of the apparent low responsible bidder is in the amount of \$1 million or more, the bidder and his/her known first-tier subcontractors which will be awarded subcontracts of \$1 million or more will be subject to full, on-site, preawarded equal opportunity compliance reviews before the award of the contract for the purpose of determining whether the bidder and his/her subcontractors are able to comply with the provisions of the equal opportunity clause.  
To be eligible for award, each bidder must comply with the affirmative action requirements which are contained in the specifications.

**Rodeo boasts 284 entries**

Of the five rodeos going on the Morrow Co. Open Rodeo can boast being the largest Triple Approved rodeo for the weekend of Aug. 18 and 19, said a spokesperson for the Morrow Co. Rodeo Committee. Largest in terms of money to be won, a total of \$15,500 was up for grabs in the eight events. Largest in terms of purse money at \$250 per event, a total of \$2,000 in added money, was made possible by the business people of Morrow County.

The 284 total entries were easily twice last year's and the most for several years.  
The Rodeo's rough stock entries were up over last years, paying testimony to the excellence of the P-9 Stock of Lebanon, Oregon said Rodeo Committee member Mickey Madison. "When the top bull rider Ernie Marsh rides to a score of 81, the winning saddlebronc rider Rob McLean scores a 72, and you have a split of Joel Patterson and Scott Corey both scoring 73 points in the bareback event you've seen some tough rough stock in action."

Six entries in the Suicide race made for one mad dash to the rodeo arena starting off Sunday's Open Rodeo. Coming out on top of the rest of the racers was Katrina Ray, Hermiston. Placing second was Jack Yocom of Lexington.

The Rodeo Committee is very excited and optimistic about the possibilities of improving the '85

Rodeo. "We have certainly seen the worst and the best that can happen at a rodeo. We are now more determined to straighten out this show and put on a top flight show in '85," concluded Madison.

**IRS advises increased withholding for social security recipients**

Some 424,000 Social Security recipients in Oregon are being urged by the Internal Revenue Service to review their total income picture to determine if some of their benefits will be taxed. Those in the taxable categories may have to make estimated tax payments or increase their withholding from other earnings said a news release from the IRS.

It is estimated that approximately ten percent of these recipients will find that a portion of their Social Security benefits are taxable.

Previously, Social Security benefits were exempt from federal income tax. However, the Social Security Amendments of 1983 made a portion of these benefits taxable to keep them in line with other retirement benefits, which generally are taxable.

These new rules for Social Security benefits also apply to recipients of Tier I Railroad Retirement benefits, since those benefits are similar to Social Security benefits.

Beginning in 1984, up to one-half of a person's Social Security benefit is taxable when, combined with other

income, it exceeds certain base amounts. The base amount is \$32,000 for a married couple filing a joint return, zero for a married person filing a separate return who lived with his or her spouse at any time during the year, and \$25,000 for any other filing status.

The amount of the social security benefit that must be included in taxable income is the lesser of: one-half of these benefits, or one-half of the combination of adjusted gross income (excluding these benefits) plus one-half of benefits over the base amount.

Also, some modifications must be made to Adjusted Gross Income (AGI). First, the deduction for a married couple when both work must be added to AGI. Also, any foreign earned income exclusion, or tax-exempt interest, or income from U.S. possessions or Puerto Rico that was excluded from gross income must be added to AGI.

To help meet this new requirement, taxpayers will receive information returns from the Social Security Administration and the Railroad Retirement Board that will show information on the total benefits received during the year. Copies also will be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by the payor. Social Security will mail out 40 million information returns, form 1099, nationwide for 1984.

The third quarter estimated tax date is September 15. Another method to cover additional tax liability is to increase withholding through filing a W-4 form with the income payor.

Further information on the taxability of these benefits can be found in the free IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," available by writing or calling the IRS.

**Grain program announcement planned**

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block said recently he will announce details of the 1985 feed grain program soon after the September crop production estimates are released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"This will be the earliest in the history of farm programs that farmers learn the details of a USDA acreage reduction program," Block said in a news release from USDA.

"This early announcement will give farmers the additional time they need to make intelligent decisions in marketing their 1984 crop and planning production for 1985."

Block said the program details would be made public as soon as he and other USDA officials analyze the September 12 crop production estimates.

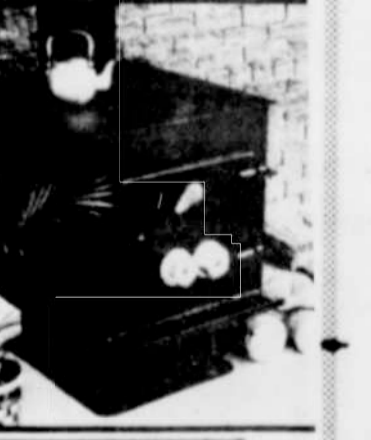
