

Mustangs humbled by RHS Pirates

The Heppner Mustangs lost to the Riverside Pirates Friday night 30-0, but the real question is did the Mustangs play that badly. NO. "I saw a lot of positive things," said head coach Craig Kitching. "Our defense played well in spots, although we did not find an answer for Martin Ramirez, if we would have stopped him, we would have stopped their entire offense. The team attitude was positive and our offensive line did an adequate job." The Mustangs only had three varsity

lettermen in the starting line-up. "With that many young kids playing Varsity you have to expect physical and mental mistakes. It just so happened it cost us every time. We have specific team goals, improvement every ball game. The wins and losses will take care of themselves," said Kitching. Junior running back Martin Ramirez rushed for 150 yards, the rest of the team had a total of 16 yards. Riverside didn't score until the second quarter on a run by Ramirez and the Mustangs were only down 6-0 at halftime.

Quarterback Dwight Osborn had the second touchdown, followed by a touchdown pass and run by split end Steve Paul gave the Pirates a 30 point cushion with three minutes left in the game. The Mustangs had 67 total yards. Quarterback Ron Doherty was 6-9 for 69 yards, but the rushing game for the Mustangs had a -2 yards. "We need improvement in all areas. Our running backs need to run with more authority. A lot of mental mistakes. Our special team play needs improvement although

our kick-off return did well," said Kitching. Coach Kitching said Weston will be tough but also stated "All games will be tough." "We're concerned with improvement week to week; we have a good scouting report on Weston. We will spend the week ironing out some things on offense and making adjustments on defense. If we accomplish the goals set for ourselves before the game, the score will take care of itself." The Mustangs play at Athena Friday night at 7:30.
