The program, designed to explore the grief process, is co-sponsored by the Umatilla County Extension Service and Foster Grandparents and Senior Companions Program.

"For those of us in helping roles, knowing more can help us understand the behavior we observe as the grieving person progresses through the grief process. Family and professional caregivers are especially encouraged to attend," said Schmall.

She is currently the OSU Extension gerontology specialist, and prior to 1978 she directed the OSU Program on Gerontology for three years.

Marijuana seizures

An undercover narcotics investigation last June and July initiated by the sheriff's department, resulted in the indictment and arrest of four Heppner men on drug charges. Arrested were James Ray Steelman, James Clarence Benson, Nathan Ray Hammons, and Bryce Shawn Powell.

The investigation was primarily aimed at "hard drug dealers",

explained the sheriff department spokesperson. Although opportunities to charge marijuana users were present, these were passed up in favor of the hard drug dealers. Small quantities of methamphetamine (speed) and cocaine were also seized. These two drugs were primarily the hard drugs being sold in the Heppner area, concluded the spokesperson.

- Should Willow Creek Lake be opened for motorized boating or should some types of speed limits or other restrictions be applied?
- Should camping facilities be

developed at the project or should it be used for day-use types of activities only?

—If camping facilities are provided, should they be a primitive type or feature full hook ups?

—Are there any other uses or developments not shown that you would like to see included?
