Goose hunting restrictions released

Several changes in goose hunting regulations were adopted this year by the Fish and Wildlife Commission. A few are more restrictive, some more liberal, and several restrictions in effect last year were continued.

In summary, new restrictions include:

—A closed season statewide for cackling Canada geese.
 —A two-week delay in the opening of the dark goose season in Lake and Klamath counties.

—A shortened, one-month goose season in western Oregon with a reduced goose bag limit.

Restrictions continued from last season include:

—A closed season for Pacific brant.

—Closed areas on the Oregon coast to protect the endangered Aleutian Canada goose.

Liberalized goose hunting regulations include:

—A daily bag limit of three white geese from October 13 through the close of waterfowl season in Lake and Klamath counties (last year hunters could take only two white geese for the first two weeks).

—An additional week of goose hunting in Baker and Malheur counties.
