Two local women named to EMT advisory board

A seven-member advisory board has been named by Blue Mountain Community College Coordinator Bill Fenton to help in the planning of educational opportunities for Emergency Medical Technicians.

Named to the board were: Betty Curnutt, Heppner; Cheryl M. Ammons, Boardman; Candance Bowman, Elgin; Joel Clift, Pendleton; Bill Gilliland, Ukiah; Steven K. Frazier, Hermiston; and Ross Snodgrass, Athena.

One of the goals of the new board is to bring EMT training sessions to outlying areas in the four-county area served, according to Fenton. The counties included are: Umatilla, Morrow, Union, and Wallowa.

The newly-named board represents 323 first responders, EMT I, II and III's in the four counties.

Bicycle safety precautions

"Now that school is back in, we're seeing more and more children riding to school on their bicycles," Sheriff Roy Drago, of Morrow County recently stated.

"All too often, children - like adults - sometimes become creatures of habit and overlook simple safety precautions. I would like to ask all school children who ride their bicycles to remember a few safety precautions:

-Only one person belongs on your bike. Never let a second person ride with you.

-Allow plenty of room for a safe stop. Never follow bikes or cars too closely.

-Keep both hands on the handle bars for safe steering.

-Always give proper signals. Keep a firm grip on the handle bars with your right hand and use your left arm and hand to signal turns and stops. Arm straight out is a left turn, arm bent up at the elbow is a right turn and arm bent down is a stop.

-Try to avoid riding your bike at night. However, if you must ride at night, you should equip your bike with a good headlight and rear reflectors. Riders should wear lightcolored or reflective clothing so others can see you better.

-Make sure you obey all traffic signs and signals. Stop completely at stop signs and always look both ways before starting out again."

Drago explained that it's easy for children to get into a routine in traveling back and forth to school. However, he stressed that children should remind themselves - and be reminded by their parents - that practicing safety everyday can save you from serious injury.

"Remember that a bicyclist is like a motorist", Drago concluded, "he must be skilled like a driver in handling his vehicle and always be cautious when traveling the roads."

Ione football team defeated by Blue Devils

The Ione football team fell to 1-1 in the Big Sky Conference and 2-2 overall with an 18 to 8 loss to the Condon Blue Devils on Friday, October 5.

Condon scored on their first possession of the game when Scott Miller broke loose for a 46-yard touchdown run. The run for two failed, as Condon led six to zero. Darrell Aamodt scored two touchdowns during the second period to give the Blue Devils an 18-0 halftime lead. His two scoring jaunts were 13 and 60 yards.

Ione finally got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter when Mark

Myers threw one yard to Randy McCabe. Meyers ran in the extra points to make the final score 18-8.

The Cardinals had three opportunities to score in the game, with field position inside Condon's 20-yard line. Ione also had an interception return for a touchdown called back because of a penalty.

Meyers led the Cardinal offense, rushing 21 times for 69 yards, and completing 11 of 26 passes for 121 yards. McCabe caught six passes for 49 yards.

Aamodt, who gained 376 yards on 31 carries against Arlington last week, had 184 yards on 27 carries. Miller tackled on 118 yards on 14 carries. Ione gained 141 yards on the

ground, and 121 yards in the air, for 262 yards of total offense. The Blue Devils had 350 yards of total offense, 327 of those on the ground.

Freshman Ken Snider led the Cards with 18 tackles. Meyers and McCabe added 17 and 14 tackles respectively.

"Not playing last week definitely hurt us. We had chances to win the game, but we just didn't execute," explained head coach Ron Mack.

Ione plays at Echo on Thursday, October 11 beginning at 7:30 p.m.
