Ground Beef Primer

From roadside restaurants to family kitchens, ground beef or "Hamburger" is a major part of the American diet. But in spite of its greatly popularity, there is nothing sold at the meat counter that causes as much confusion and misunderstanding as ground beef.

Fresh ground beef is sold as "ground chuck", "ground sirloin", "hamburger", or just plain "ground beef". The obvious reason for such a variety of names is that sometimes the meat that is ground comes from a specific section or carcass.

The lean content of ground beef is never less than 70 percent. On the other hand, the leanest ground beef has to contain approximately 10 to 15 percent fat for flavor and for ease in cooking. Some meat stores have already begun to label ground beef according to the lean-to-fat ratio, and we hope that all ground beef eventually will be labeled this way.

According to U.S. Department of Agriculture standards for labeling ground beef products, GROUND BEEF is just what the name implies: pure ground beef. No extra fat, water, extenders, or binders may be added. Seasonings can be added only if they are identified on the label. HAMBURGER, besides being the name of a sandwich, is ground beef to which

seasonings and fat may be added as it is being ground. Both ground beef and hamburger are limited to maximum 30 percent fat by weight.

Because ground beef is so popular (almost half of all beef sold is in the form of ground beef), supermarkets and butchers cannot get enough meat to grind from a carcass after the steaks, roasts and other cuts have been removed. So they sometimes buy additional less tender wholesale cuts specifically for grinding into ground beef. Or, if there is not adequate less tender beef available, sometimes more expensive roasts and other cuts are used for grinding which raises the price of ground beef.

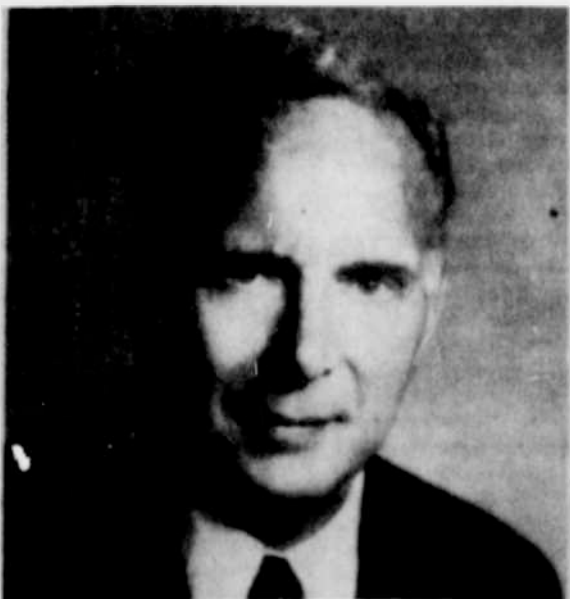
