The Oregon Wheat Growers League provides political representation, market development, research, and educational programs in behalf of Oregon wheat growers.

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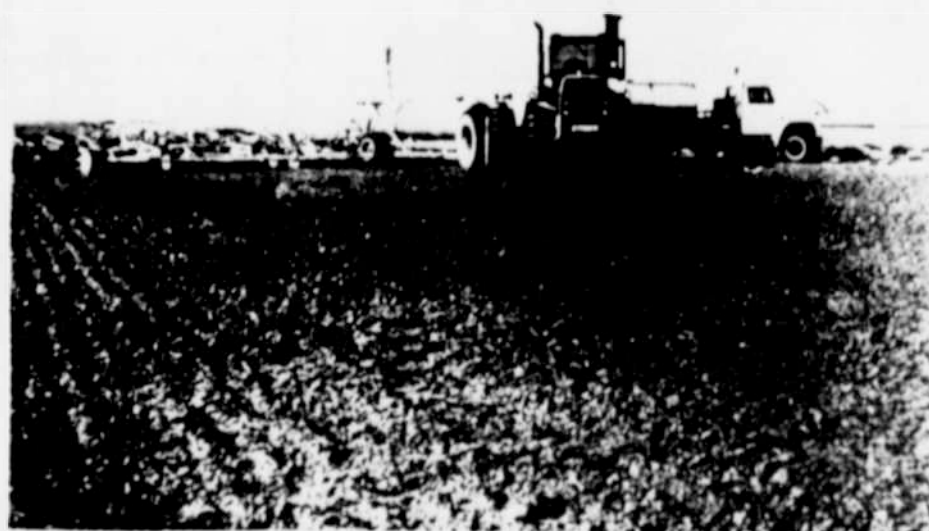
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
