## Court selected for '85 Fair & Rodeo

Bridgett Greenup was selected as Queen for the 1985 Morrow County Fair and Rodeo by the Rodeo Committee at court tryouts Sunday, Oct. 28.

Four applicants for princesses were also selected to complete the court. The applicants rode two patterns which were unannounced prior to tryouts, gave a speech, and were interviewed by the rodeo committee. Judges for the riding and speech competition ranked the girls closely and, said Mickey Madison of the Rodeo Committee, "the commit-

tee felt that all four girls were interested in promoting fair and rodeo activities and deserved the honor. The committee also felt that the larger court would be more prestigious and honor Bridgett and her family who have always been involved with fair and rodeo."

Queen Bridgett is 17 year-old senior at Heppner High School who was a princess on last year's court and is a former pennant bearer. She is the daughter of Don Greenup and the late Colleen Kilkenny Greenup.

Princess Bobbette Angell is a 15 year-old junior at HHS and the

daughter of Bobbie Angell and Larry Angell. She was a pennant bearer for last year's court, and has been active in Wranglers.

Princess Stacey Kennedy is a 15 year-old sophomore at H.H.S. and the daughter of Ellen and Larry Kennedy. She has also served as a pennant bearer for the previous court, and has been active in Wranglers and school athletics.

Princess Sheila Sieler is a 15 year-old sophomore at H.H.S. and the daughter of Myrna and George Sieler. She has been active in 4-H

and Wranglers. Princess Cindy Lou Davis is a 16 year-old junior at H.H.S. and is the daughter of Judy and Wayne Davis. She has been active in 4-H, Wranglers and school athletics.

The court will be introduced at the Morrow County Grain Growers dinner Monday, Nov. 5 and, Court Chaperone Ginger O'Brien says that they are ready for appearances at activities to promote the county. Madison concluded "The Rodeo committee is optimistic and hoping for a real good year."

## CBEC not effected by No. 3

Measure No. 3 on the Nov. 6 ballot would create a Citizens' Utility Board funded by "voluntary contributions" which would represent the interests of electric, telephone, gas, and heating utility consumers before legislative, administrative and judicial bodies.

Fred Toombs manager of Columbia Basin Electric Co-op said that the measure would not have an effect on C.B.E.C. because it "concerns investor owned utilities under the public service commission."

## MCGG to hold annual meeting Nov. 5

The manager of a large Japanese trading house in Portland will be the featured speaker at this year's Morrow County Grain Growers Annual Meeting to be held Monday, Nov. 5 at the fairgrounds in Heppner.

Takenobu Sato is the manager of Nichimen America Inc., Portland and his speech will address Japanese trade with the U.S. and how Japanese trading houses operate.

The annual meeting gets underway Monday with dinner at 6 p.m. and will include reports from various officers of the company, and the election of directors.

Running for four director positions are eight people: Gary Grieb, Lyle Peck, John Ledbetter, Mark Miller, Dwight Bailey, Bill Doherty and Paul Taylor. For associate director Stan Kemp, Scott Madison, Alvin McCabe and Paul Proudfoot will be running.

Co-op members will also be voting on a bylaw amendment limiting the number of terms a director may serve.

There will be free babysitting during the annual meeting.

Sato, the featured speaker, was born in 1942 and grew up in Japan, except for 3½ years spent in Hawaii during his boyhood years.

He graduated from Waseda University in 1966 majoring in business.

Also that year he joined Nichimen Corp. and was assigned to the feedgrain section. In 1974 he transferred to the New York office where he was responsible for feedgrain merchandising and chartering.

Five years later in 1979 Sato was transferred to the Tokyo office where he was in charge of wheat and barley, and from there he moved to the Portland office in 1982 where he was assigned the manager.

## Cheese to be given away

## CBEC annual meeting set Nov. 8

The 40th Annual Meeting of Columbia Basin Electric Cooperative, Inc. will be held at the Isobel Edward Building in Fossil, Oregon on Thursday, November 8, 1984. Registration will begin at 5 p.m., dinner at 6 p.m. and the business meeting at 7 p.m. The meeting is for the purpose of electing three directors for a three year term and two directors for a two year term.

On the ballot for three-year terms are the incumbents: rural zone 3-Harold Rietmann, rural zone 4-Dexter Miles, and Heppner City zone 8-Bob Lankford.

Nominees for the two year terms are Douglas Wilson-the rural zone 2

incumbent and for Heppner city zone 8 incumbent Ed Tarnasky and Donna Moeller.

Tarnasky, 35, has lived in Heppner for 12 years. He is employed as a forester for Kinzua Corp. He was appointed to the C.B.E.C. Board of Directors six months ago. He and his wife Sheridan have two children. He says, "I was appointed to fill out a term. I've found the job to be an interesting one. My main concern is controlling rate increases for Columbia Basin patrons."

Moeller, 31, has lived in Heppner eight years and is employed as a bookkeeper for Ron McDonald Chevrolet. She and her husband, Chuck,

have two children. She submitted the following statement:

"I feel it is time that there is a woman on the Board of Directors of our electric coop. I have absolutely no experience being on a board of this type, therefore I can go into service with an open mind and hopefully some fresh ideas. I have no 'axes' to grind with anyone or any group of people. My only interest and desire would be to serve the Columbia Basin patrons to the best of my ability."

## Home Health gets \$800

Tri-County Home Health Agency recently received \$800 in financial support from United Way of Morrow County. Sandra Rill, Administrator of the Agency, states the United Way funds along with private donations are placed in a special fund that is used only for patient care and needed medical equipment and supplies for those residents of Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler Counties who are in need of nursing care in their homes but unable to qualify due to financial reasons.

Tri-County H.H.A. is a private non-profit organization providing skilled nursing to the homebound patient. Home health care is available only under the supervision of a patient's physician.
