Oregon traffic fatalities dropped nearly 36 percent during October, the Motor Vehicles Division reported in early November.

The division reported 34 people were killed in traffic crashes during October of this year, compared with 53 fatalities in October last year.

Despite the drop in the October toll, the yearly traffic death count for 1984 continues to run about four percent ahead of 1983. Oregon had recorded 471 traffic deaths as of October 31 of this year, compared with 453 fatalities recorded on the same date last year.

The October toll included three motorcyclists and four pedestrians. One traffic fatality occurred in the Morrow Counties.
