News from the Neighborhood Center

The Low Income Energy (fuel) Assistance Program for south Morrow County will begin Friday, Dec. 7 announced a spokesperson for the Heppner Neighborhood Center.

Clients need to call the Neighborhood Center for appointments. The program is based on federal guidelines which base eligibility at 125 percent of the poverty level. For example, the gross income for a family of one is \$519 per month. A family of two with a gross income of \$700 also would be eligible. Medical expenses are allowable deductions from the gross income, the spokesperson explained. Those filing for assistance whose income is primarily from self-employment, investments or rentals will be required to bring bank statements or to wait to use their 1984 income tax returns as proof of income. These applicants must also sign a disclaimer stating that the information is correct and true. Client who have zero income will be required to have a notarized statement from a disinterested per-

son to verify that fact and to explain how they are able to live without income.

Clients must bring 1) proof of income, 2) medical bills, and 3) fuel bills to apply. "Remember, we do not make the rules and regulations, but only follow the regulations of the federal and state departments of energy," says center director Pat Brindle. "False information is cause of repayment of a fraudulent payment plus a \$10,000 fine or prison."
