Spicy brew began as greeting

The traditional wassail bowl, brimming with its hot, aromatic spiced fruit punch, has been the highlight of European holiday gatherings for centuries.

The term "wassail," an Old English and Old Norse greeting meaning "be in good health," was first used as a toast by the medieval English. Because most toasting was done at holiday times, "wassail" came to mean, by the 16th century, the traditional spiced ale served on Twelfth Night, Christmas Eve, and New Year's Eve.

Now, merry-makers on this side of the world can enjoy a new version of this traditional spicy brew with two non-alcoholic wassail recipes.

Belgian Wassail uses apple cider mulled with oranges, lemons, sugar and spices for a mellow, warming punch.

And simmer apple juice with orange, pineapple and lemon juice, sugar and spices for tangy Christmas Wassail.

Belgian Wassail
1 gallon (16 cups) apple cider
2 oranges
2 lemons
1 cup sugar
3/4 tablespoon whole allspice
2 sticks cinnamon
1 quart (4 cups) cold water
Squeeze the juice from oranges and lemons. Put juice aside. Boil orange and lemon rinds with spices and water. Simmer one hour. Strain and add sugar, cider and juice. Serve hot. Serves 20.

Christmas Wassail
1 gallon (16 cups) apple juice
1 quart (4 cups) orange juice
2 cups lemon juice
1 1/2 cups sugar
one 16-ounce can frozen pineapple juice, thawed
2 cinnamon sticks
2 teaspoon cloves
Put all ingredients in pan and heat to boiling. Simmer for one hour. Serves 24.

Theresa Lindsay and her brother Alex Lindsay were outstanding as the tipsy, villainous orphanage manager Miss Hannigan and her shy brother, Rooster Hannigan, who connived to gain the \$50,000 that Daddy Warbucks was offering to Annie's real parents. Christy Rathbun as Lily St. Regis, Rooster's woman, carried her part well, also. These above principals were able to sing the popular songs well, project their lines well and perform several dance sequences nicely. The Cerullo's dog, Buffy, was a scene stealer as Sandy.

The musical contains two acts. Act I is divided into eight scenes and Act II into five scenes. The time was during Franklin Roosevelt's first administration when the great depression was the dominating factor of national life. The setting was mainly in New York City, at the municipal orphanage, on the streets, around a bonfire in Hooverville and in Oliver Warbucks' Fifth Avenue mansion. In Act II, Scene 3, the leads appeared in the cabinet room of the White House.

In the Hooverville and White House scenes, a group of adults with outstanding vocal talents augmented the student cast. Jane Rawlins, former drama coach, recruited Polly Bigelow, Dave Hampton, Nadine Toombs, Ron Toombs, Cathy Barker, Connie Hammons and Bill Baker to portray the destitute Hoovervillites and then later the distinguished governmental leaders who surrounded wheelchair-bound Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who was played effectively by Joe McDonald. Director Cerullo appeared briefly as a depression-time apple seller in New York City.

The chorus of girls who were confined with Annie in the municipal orphanage included Sofi Struthers, Christy Warren, Beth Forrar, Joyce-Lyn Ferrell, Kim Stookey, Dina Ruiz,

Monique Allan, and Lisa Ferrell. They all performed convincingly. Kevin Florea played double roles as Bundles and also as Drake, Warbucks' butler. Fellow Warbucks servants were Windi Mitchell, Val Hager, Angela Lewiston, Merry DeSpain, MaryAnn Cerullo, Bobby Riehl and the accommodating Ken Curtis who came to help as a servant and as the dog catcher late in the preparation schedule. Other students who had parts were Nancy Wright as a star-to-be, and Mike Storm who doubled as a Marine guard and as Lt. Ward.

In Scene 1 of Act II, a radio program "Hour of Smiles," the voices broadcast belonged to Dave Sinkevitch, MaryAnn Cerullo, Margo Sinkevitch, Wanda Riley and Larry Cerullo.

Most essential to the successful musical was the crew: music directors were Kitty Bredemier and Margo Sinkevitch, who also worked on choreography with husband Dave and Director Larry, and who stayed at the piano during the entire show, and also worked with Val Volesky on

the costuming. The set was constructed by Gene Lancaster, the Heppner High Chorus and the Reading Class. Kitty Bredemier, Kevin Florea and Dennis Warren worked with the sound and Gene Lancaster, Dwan Lewiston and Nancy Martin managed the lights. Kym Warren was cue girl.

We sincerely congratulate Director Cerullo and the outstanding cast and crew and thank them along with everyone involved for bringing "Annie" to Heppner.
