

JV Cards improve

The lone junior varsity basketball team improved to 3-0 with a strong second half and beat the Heppner Freshmen by the score of 50-30 on Friday, Dec. 28.

The opening period saw the Mustangs take a 12 to 7 lead over the Cardinals, behind Duane Ball's eight points.

However, lone came back to grab a 17-16 advantage at intermission. Lone outscored Heppner 10 to 4 in the quarter, as Kevin Ball tossed in six points.

Both teams were tied at 20 in the third quarter, when the Cards scored the last 13 points of the quarter to go ahead 33-20. Chris Rea put in 12 in the quarter.

Lone went on to defeat the Mustangs 50 to 30. The Cardinals controlled the final period 17-10.

Heppner was called for 28 fouls and had four people foul out. As a result, the Cardinals converted 16 of 30 free throws for 53 percent. Meanwhile, the Mustangs shot 50 percent, making four of eight shots.

Rea led all scorers with 19 points. Kevin Ball added 14 for lone. Duane Ball and Jason Dougherty both got ten points for Heppner.

Lone will play at 4:30 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 4 at Condon.
