

## Art club selects artist for program in schools



The Morrow County Arts and Crafts Assoc. has selected Sandy Brooke of Sisters as the artist whom they will hire to fill the Artist-in-Education position in the Heppner schools. Brooke is a mixed media artist with skills in graphics, painting, drawing and murals. She will be in Heppner from March 11-22.

The school district usually pays two-thirds of the cost for an artist and the Eastern Oregon Regional Arts Council provides the other third. In this case, however, the Morrow County Schools have adopted the program, but the Art Assoc. will provide the district's share of the funds which amounts to \$574. EORAC contributes \$288.

Money has been raised by the Arts and Crafts Assoc. by various fund-raisers including the raffle of art work donated by the club's members. Linda LaRue was the drawing winner announced at the Artificery of the dry point donated by Tina Tharpe.

Pauline Matheny, a Heppner artist, has donated an oil painting, titled "Solitude" which will be drawn for at the close of the St. Patrick's Day celebration March 16. Tickets will be available during the celebration and before that from Assoc. members at 50 cents per ticket or three for \$1. The painting is currently on display at Murray's Drug Store in Heppner.

Matheny began painting in 1968 when she attended a Blue Mountain Community College course taught by Dr. McDevitt. She says that she just coasted and painted on her own following that but didn't ever quit. Later, she took a drawing class from Tom Shear who was a high school art teacher and photographer and another drawing class from Cal Durham of Pendleton.

She has taken classes in oils from Robert Walton of Leavenworth, Washington; Robert Thomas of Boise, Idaho; Bernie Jenson of Benton City; Roberta Vandehey of Fossil; and a seascape and portrait class from Sam Roberts.

Matheny received a Sweepstakes award one year for the painting she exhibited at the Morrow County Fair. She has also exhibited at the

January 27-February 2, 1985 has been designated National Meat Week, according to Donald Ostensoe, manager of Oregon Beef Council and Executive Vice President of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association.

Last year the American Meat Industry launched a coordinated effort to promote the positive attributes of red meat products. This cooperative venture developed publicity from the major red meat industries such as: National Live Stock and Meat Board, National Cattlemen's Association, American Meat Institute, Pork and Sheep Producer's Council, and a number of others. Most state Beef Councils like the Oregon Beef Council also directed their promotion and publicity efforts toward providing the consumer with facts about red meat such as:

-Today's livestock is 10 to 50 percent leaner than it was 25 years ago.

-Red meat is low in calories and is also a rich source of vitamins and minerals, making it one of the most nutrient-dense foods.

-Americans consume just under four ounces of red meat per day.

Ostensoe said that "It is vitally important that today's consumer be made aware that red meat is a healthy, wholesome part of today's diet. The Oregon Beef Council, Cattlemen's Association and Oregon CowBelles will support this year's National Meat Week and its theme 'Meat: A Food For Fitness.' The Oregon and National campaign will include editorial, publicity, and promotion projects, through news and feature releases concluded Ostensoe.

of exchange which held up Heppner's business structure during the deepest throes of depression, besides returning a nice profit to the community."
