

Fillies trounce TigerScots 63-43

The Heppner Fillies played their second league game Saturday Jan. 5 at Heppner against the Weston-McEwen TigerScots.

The starters for the Heppner Fillies were guards Stephani Payne and Missy Turner, forwards Lana Reid and Jodi Padberg and center Penny Connor.

The Fillies received the tip off to start the game and took the ball all the way to the basket for two points. The game was started at a very fast pace with each team scoring each time down the court. The first time out was taken with a tie score at 8-8. Heppner was playing a full court press while Weston-McEwen set back in their defense. Weston-McEwen had a fairly big team but Heppner marched up pretty well and were able to grab down quite a few rebounds both offensively and defensively. The Fillies continued using a full court press throughout the first quarter and pulled ahead just by four. The score was 14-10.

The second quarter began as Heppner held on to their lead. It was close throughout the second quarter. The Fillies continued with their full court press and the TigerScots started to do the same. The Weston-McEwen TigerScots had some very good shooters which forced the Fillies to hustle and be on their toes at all times. Heppner ran their fast break whenever they could and otherwise they were very patient and ran through their offense until they could make something work.

At the end of the second quarter Heppner was still ahead, but the score was close, and it could have been anyone's game. The score was Heppner 35 and Weston-McEwen 28. Heppner received the tip off at the start of the third quarter. The game was still going at a very fast pace with a lot of determination from both teams. Weston-McEwen was giving the Fillies a good, hard fight and it made both teams work. The Fillies were really hustling as they ended up with quite a few steals. The Fillies did get into a little foul trouble but they held that off until late in the quarter. The Fillies held the lead as the third quarter ended, with a score of 48-39.

Weston-McEwen received the tip off, but Heppner was really hustling and stole the ball. They took the ball all the way down court and in for two points. Towards the end of the quarter Weston-McEwen was hurting for points so they put a lot of pressure on the ball. Heppner handled in very well and were put up at the free throw line. With only nine seconds left in the game, Heppner led 61-43—only two points needed for a 20 point spread. Weston-McEwen had possession of the ball and Heppner's Lana Reid made a steal. The Fillies hustled down court. With five seconds left, the ball was knocked out of court by a TigerScot. Again, with three seconds left the TigerScots knocked the ball out of bounds. At three seconds, Stephanie Payne passed the ball in bounds to teammate Jodi Padberg. One dribble, one second and the shot went up. With the sound of the buzzer the ball swooshed through the hoop and the Heppner Fillies won the game by 20 points.

The final score was 63-43 with good effort and teamwork by the Fillies. Jodi Padberg led the Fillies with 25 points and eight rebounds. Lana Reid added 11 points, 10 rebounds and four steals. Stephani Payne also put in 10 points and had seven assists. The Heppner Fillies are now 2-0 in league play. Umatilla takes first place in the league with 2-0 league record, but, 10-0 season record while

the Fillies are second with a 6-1 season record. Friday, Jan. 11 the Heppner Fillies will play their third league game here at Heppner against the Pilot Rock Rockets. Saturday, Jan. 12, the Fillies travel to Umatilla to play the Umatilla Vikings. Both nights the Fillies will

The lone boys basketball team now stands at 2-0 in the Big Sky Conference and 9-1 overall following a 55-30 victory over the Cascade Locks Pirates on Saturday, Jan. 5.

Both teams started out slowly in the first quarter. Mark Meyers put in six points as lone went out in front of Cascade Locks 8-4. The Cardinals blew the game wide open in the second period by outscoring the Pirates 21 to 8. At halftime the Cardinals were ahead 29-12. Meyers and Randy McCabe each scored nine in the period.

Ben Davis tossed in seven points in the third quarter for Cascade Locks, but lone outscored Cascade Locks 11-9.

Meyers added six more points in the final period as the Cards won 55 to 30.

Lone had a 47 to 32 advantage on the boards. McCabe, Mike Rietmann, and Donnie Doherty each gathered 10 rebounds.

Meyers netted 25 points, as he led all scorers. McCabe added 19 more. Dorris led the Pirates, scoring 13.

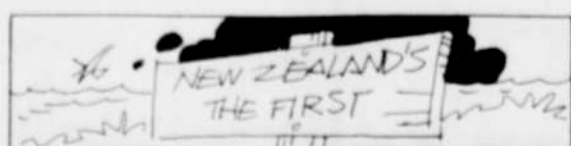
Jeff Ball gave out eight of lone's 19 assists. McCabe handed out five more and Meyers dished out four. Meyers also had five steals. Lone turned the ball over 16 times, compared to 21 for Cascade Locks.

The Cards shot 56 field goals and made 23 for 41 percent. The Pirates made only 12 of 50 field goal tries for 24 percent. At the free throw line

lone shot 41 percent, making nine of 22. Cascade Locks made six of 15 for 40 percent.

Mustangs drop 2nd league game with 57-38 loss to TigerScots

The Heppner Mustangs fell to a 0-2 league record Saturday night against the Weston-McEwen TigerScots 57-38.

Weston started off quick in the first quarter scoring the first eight points of the game, but after a Heppner timeout, Todd Lindsay made three shots from the baseline, to narrow the margin, but Tom Meier's six points led the way to a 17-11 first quarter lead.

The Mustangs kept it close and were still conceivably in the game at halftime, down by eleven, 29-18.

The TigerScots kept up their attack in the third quarter outscoring Heppner 15-6 in the stanza and took a 20 point lead heading into the fourth quarter. Heppner narrowly outscored Weston 15-14 in the final quarter and lost by 19.

"The main reason for the loss was our poor shooting. We had more open shots than we've ever had," said Heppner coach Brent Eggers. "If we had hit half of our open shots it would have been a different ball game. They killed us on the rebounds too."

Heppner plays Pilot Rock and Umatilla next weekend. "We need to execute our offense and not allow teams to run on us. I think we definitely need to improve on our rebounding. Our defense has

The Cardinals went on to win 52-16. Hams tossed in 26 points to lead all scorers. Judy Wittenberg topped the Pirates with eight.

The Cards were good on 23 of 54 field goals for 43 percent, whereas Cascade Locks made only seven field goals. At the foul line, lone was six for 14, 43 percent, while the Pirates made two of six shots for 33 percent.

The Cardinals gathered 33 rebounds. The Cardinals had six people with more than five boards, led by Hams' eight. Lone also

committed a season-low 18 turnovers. Lone stole the ball 28 times, a season-high. Patty McElligott and Candi Rudisill each got seven steals. Rudisill handed out seven assists, while Kim McCabe dished out four more.

Mustangs bow to Pirates

The Heppner Mustangs dropped their sixth contest of the season Friday and their first league game against the Riverside Pirates 65-33.

The Mustangs played very well in the first quarter, controlling the tempo and staying close to the Pirates who are considered one of the top teams in the state, falling behind only, 12-10.

The two teams were playing well in the second quarter and Heppner was only down by six at the half, 26-20.

"Anytime we shoot well we'll be right in the game," said coach Brent Eggers. "We shot well in the first half and executed our game plan."

The third quarter was the clincher for the Pirates because their running game was clicking. They outscored Heppner 14-4 in the quarter for a comfortable 40-24 lead heading into the final quarter.

The Pirates erupted for 25 points in the final stanza to put the icing on the cake for their first league victory.

"In the second half we allowed them to change the tempo of the game, they got their running game going and shot very well," said Eggers.
