Ext. letters teach money skills

It's so often true that young families who sharpen their financial management skills now will avoid problems later. That's why the Extension Service is offering a four letter series called "Your Money Matter\$" to people between the ages of 18 and 34. The letters are available without charge.

Prepared under the leadership of Alice Mills Morrow, Extension family economics specialist, the letters contain basic financial planning and management information as well as worksheets to help determine such things as the family's net worth.

Persons interested in receiving the letters, the first of which will be mailed in mid-February, must register with the Morrow County Extension office by January 31.

The first letter deals with financial planning, including looking at where

money is spent and how to build a family spending plan. The second, managing credit use, discusses such topics as the advantages and disadvantages of credit, how much credit the family can afford, and includes an exercise to show the family's current debt commitments.

Protecting against financial risks, which usually means some form of insurance, is the topic of the third letter. It includes a form to help families think about financial risks, their plans to reduce those risks and what changes may be needed in those plans.

The last letter discusses savings which can help the family increase its money. It includes a worksheet to help people determine their net worth and how it is growing or decreasing.

Medical Topics

The Gazette-Times is pleased to share his entertaining, sometimes informative, but always interesting comments with its readers also.

Pobanz had a private practice in Ontario for 30 years before moving to Hood River.

In September, 1983, he began keeping office hours at the North Morrow Medical Clinic in Boardman. He has extended his practice to include an office at Irrigon City Hall and another in Hood River.

He and his wife, Aileen who works for the Oregon State Children's Services Division, live in Hood River.

We are slowly learning a lot more about geriatrics. Someone figured out that we do not do research on 90-year-olds, and that which applies at 45-55 may not be valid at all at 90. One example: a number of important long-term medicines can be stopped after age 80 or so, and nothing happens.

We expect to slow down in our later years, but we are wrong in thinking intelligence fades. Mostly, it doesn't lessen at all, it just takes longer to express oneself. I had an absolutely marvelous conversation last spring with Beatrice, age 92, on economics and investing, but it took a long time to have it. Very slow, but she was a lot sharper than I.

As younger folks, we feel impatience with deafness, and decreased vision, and decreased responses, and outbursts of anger (the anger of frustration?), and the slow shuffle, and the halting movements, and the mixing up of medicines, and the forgetfulness, and decreasing participation, and the need for us to give extra help.

But I wonder, if we sat down prepared to listen, if there isn't a lot of "philosophy life," and perspective, in those experienced old heads. Maybe some things are not worth fussing about. After years, one figures out how to do it better (like, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it"). A lot of activity could burn less energy in some projects. More expensive may not be better. "Don't sweat the small stuff, and it's all small stuff."

Peace of mind, equanimity, the pleasure of memories, a special appreciation of life's beauties — probably we underestimate some of the desirability of being 89 some day.

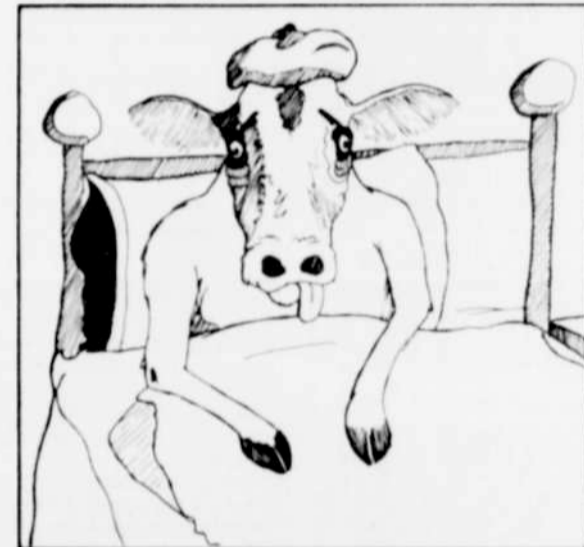
