

Sheriff summarizes year's activities

Morrow County Sheriff Roy Drago has submitted the following report of cases handled by the Sheriff's office by type of crime between January 1 and December 31 of 1984.

Burglary-27; Theft-67; Unauthorized Use Motor Vehicle-5; Recovered Stolen Vehicle-2; Criminal Mischief-21; Criminal Trespass-10; Worthless Document-8; Scam Operation-2; Bomb Threat-2; Drugs Marijuana Seizure-3; Assault-Menacing-Reckless Endangering-27; Rape-2; Sexual Abuse-3; Child Abuse-Neglect-Endangering a Minor-3; Violation of Restraining Order-2; Fugitive Arrests-21; Motor Vehicle Accidents-39; Driving Under Influence Intoxicants-29; Hit and Run-8; Felony Driving While Revoked-1; New Ordinance: Interference with Police Officer-2; Suicide-1; Miscellaneous-48 (Includes Livestock at Large, Maintain Public Nuisance, Unattended deaths, Transports to Eastern Oregon State Hospital, Furnish Alcohol to Minor, Driving While Suspended, Runaway Juveniles, etc.); Dispatcher-Handled-160 (Includes Computer Entry of Stolen Property, Assist Other Agencies, Warrant Arrest by Other Agencies, Entering Restraining Orders, Runaway Juveniles, Missing Persons, etc.).

Total Cases handled is 492. Other activities of the sheriff's office included: Polygraph exams-25; Citations issued-328; Traffic warnings issued-609; Civil Process served-916; Civil Process Attempts-386; and Total Custody Arrests-97.

An average of 2.5 civil papers were served each day. An average of 562.96 miles were driven each day for a yearly total of 205,482.

Prisoner transportations included: total prisoners transported-99; total number of transports-227; Total man hours used-681; and Total miles driven-26,903.

Officers were tied up in transporting prisoners an average of 3 hours per transport. Average miles driven were 118.5 per transport. Each prisoner was transported an average of 2.29 times.

In 1984, more prisoners were transported than in 1983; however, fewer transports were actually made. This resulted in fewer hours spent and fewer miles driven concluded the sheriff.
