

Mustangs drop 54-38 contest to Redsidies

The Heppner Mustangs faced the 11th ranked team in state last Tuesday night and after falling behind 16-2 in the first quarter came back to make somewhat of a game of it but lost 54-38 to the Wasco County Redsidies.

The first quarter was terrible for the Mustangs as they could only manage a field goal by Keith Kenison and quickly fell behind by 14 points.

"Basically our lack of offense hurt us in that first period," said Mustang Coach Brent Eggers, "our defense was just what we wanted, they hit some tough outside shots."

Heppner outscored the Redsidies by one point in the second quarter but still found themselves down by 13 points (24-11) at halftime.

The Mustangs scored 14 points in the third quarter behind Kenison who had eight points and cut the lead to 11. But the Redsidies played a strong fourth quarter, led by Jeff Hull

and Walt Johnson with seven points apiece and closed out the margin of victory at 16.

"We got the ball inside a little better," said Eggers about his offense after the first period, "instead of relying on the outside shot which we weren't getting."

The Mustangs shot 33 percent from the floor on 15 of 45; the Redsidies were 22-39 for 56 percent.

Kenison led Heppner with 10 points and 10 rebounds. Ken Graves grabbed seven boards and Jim

McConnell dished out six assists. Hull had 17 to lead the Redsidies.

The lone boys basketball team dropped a 63 to 49 contest to the Helix Grizzlies on Tuesday, Feb. 5.

Early in the opening period, lone controlled the tempo, Helix, however, managed a 14-12 lead. Randy McCabe scored six for lone, as did Bruce Spratling for Helix.

The second quarter was disastrous for the Cardinals, as the Grizzlies outscored the Cardinals 16 to four, to lead 30-16 at intermission. Tim Porter put in eight for the Grizzlies.

With the offensive rebounding of Ken Rankin producing seven points, Helix took the third period 15-14, pushing their lead to 45-30. Mark Meyers tossed in six for lone.

The Cards had a 19 to 18 advantage during the fourth quarter, but lost 63-49.

McCabe led lone with 17 points. Donnie Doherty, Meyers and Mike Rietmann added 12, ten, and eight points respectively for lone.

Porter topped a balance Grizzly punch with 17 points. Chris Rees gunned in 14; Spratling chipped in 12, and Rankin pumped in 11. The Grizzlies were without junior forward Troy Molendyke who had a bad cold. Molendyke had been the leading scorer in the Big Sky Conference, averaging over 23 points a game.


