Wheat acreage down 8%

Oregon farmers intend to plant 100,000 acres of spring wheat in 1985, according to a February 1 planting intentions survey conducted by the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This acreage combined with an earlier estimate of 1,000,000 acres of winter wheat planted last fall, plus all wheat plantings at 1,100,000 acres or eight percent

below last year. Other crop acreages Oregon farmers intend to plant include: 65,000 acres of field corn for all purposes, 13 percent below last year; 150,000 acres of oats, 30 percent above the 1984 acreage; and 310,000 acres of barley, seven percent above last year. Growers also expect to harvest 1,080,000 acres of all hay, two percent less than last year.

10 YEARS Ago February 27, 1975

In special session, the Morrow County Court accepted a tentative proposal from Boise Cascade Corporation for a modular medical clinic not to exceed a cost of \$42,000. The Morrow County School Board had a two-year contract for salaries for certified teaching staff which represented a 12.3 percent pay hike over the previous year's schedule. A cost-of-living increase was built in for the following year.

25 YEARS Ago February 25, 1960

Money was to be included in the 1960-61 school budget to allow the reopening of seventh and eighth grade classes in Boardman based on a projected increase in enrollment there.

City of Heppner crews began laying several thousand feet of new six inch water pipe along South Main street which would extend to south city limits to improve the water supply along Condon Highway and Cemetery Hill.

50 Years Ago February 28, 1935

Two "youthful sleuths" discovered guns which had been stolen from the sheriff's office when they were rummaging through a scrap pile. Sheriff C.J.D. Bauman told the Gazette-Times that the gun theft had been committed in mid-January and was not yet entirely solved.

Mrs. James L. Leach, Lexington was awarded a Certificate of Recipe Endorsement by "Better Homes and Gardens" magazine for her recipe "Italian Spaghetti."

The headline: "Jupe tips sprinkler." The story: "A gentle warm rain started today off with prospects of Heppner and the surrounding country receiving a quantity of needed moisture.
