A meeting of the Morrow County Fair Board and Fair Committee has been scheduled for Monday, March 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the fairgrounds.

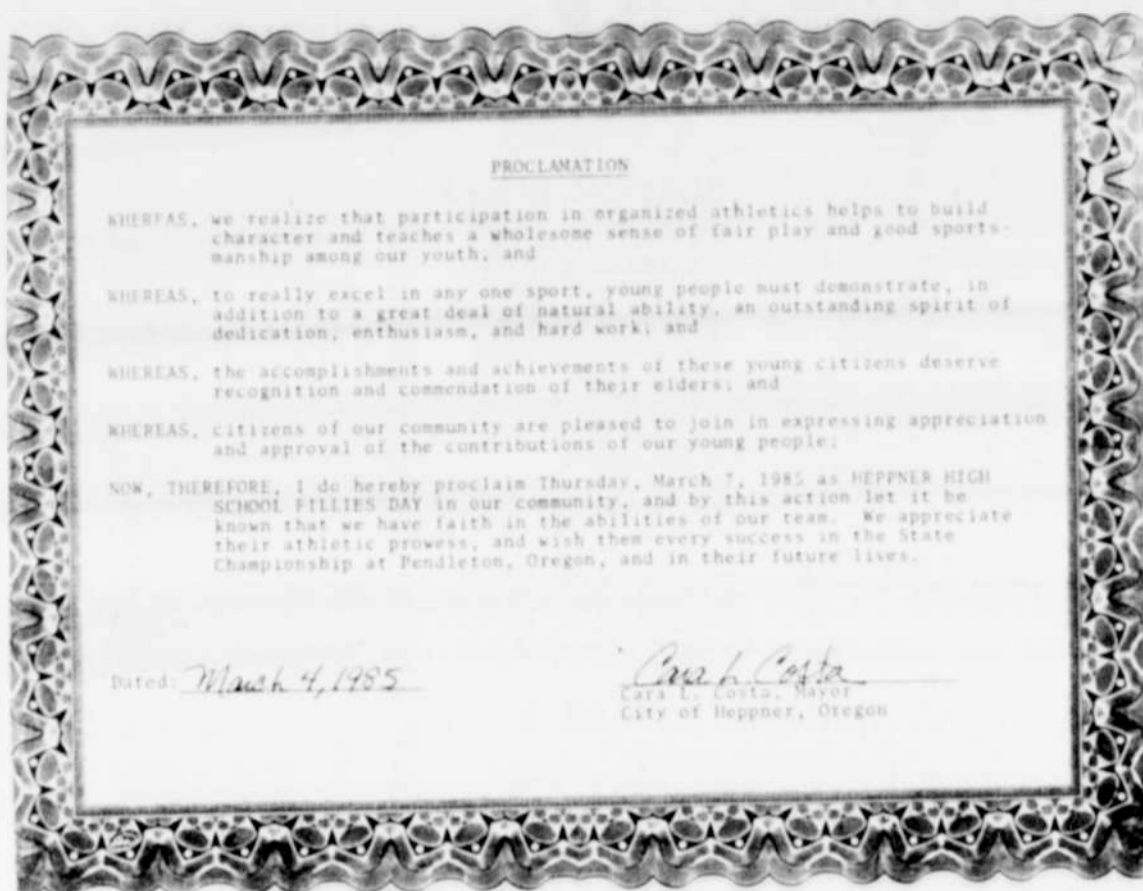
Heppner students to get hands-on art experience

Elementary and Junior High School students will be able to jump "hands first" into art as a result of a dynamic program getting underway this Monday in the Heppner schools.

Sandy Brooke, an artist from Sisters, will be an artist-in-residence for two weeks in the Heppner schools as a result of sponsorship by the Eastern Oregon Regional Arts Council and funding by the Morrow County Creative Arts and Crafts Association.

For a two-week period Brooke will be working with students in creating

a mural. Heppner school art instructor Ron Forrar said children will be working on four mural panels, each four feet by eight feet. "Dance and visual art will be combined to put art on a mural scale," said Forrar. Also participating in the project will be the local aerobics group and the high school dance team. Forrar said the panels will be hung permanently in the Heppner Elementary multi-purpose room and will be available for viewing within the month.

According to Forrar, the experience will be the first of its kind in Morrow County.

School children in first through eighth grade will have the hands on experience of painting with acrylics in creating the mural, which is to be a "figurative drawing," said Forrar.

Brooke will also be presenting a program at Kate's Pastry and Pizza

Monday evening March 18 for the Morrow County Creative Arts and Crafts.

Brooke has a bachelor's degree in fine arts from the University of Oregon and received a secondary teaching certificate in 1976. She taught in Portland schools and was instructor at Central Oregon College

community education. She has exhibited work in many group and one-person shows, has owned and operated an art gallery and has worked as a self-employed graphic designer. She has had experience in artist-in-residence programs since 1978.

Two important issues concerning information delivery services have recently been presented to the Oregon Public Utility Commissioner.

by dialing 1+976 and the last four digits of the service's phone number (no long distance charges apply).

"976" is available in many other states across the U.S. Companies providing these services usually charge for them.

The charges for each call placed to a 976 num-

ber will appear on your PNB bill. PNB will provide the network over which the calls are carried and will handle billing for the calls. PNB will not determine the content of the messages provided, nor the charges.

On the second issue, the Oregon Public Util-

ity Commissioner will hold a pre-hearing conference in Salem on the Time of Day question, March 7, 1985.

If approved, a new company, Tel-Time, Inc., will offer an enhanced "Time and Temperature" service for a 30-cents-per-call charge.

Charging for Time of Day will mostly affect the 22 percent of customers who frequently use the service. Pacific Northwest Bell no longer receives significant revenues for nationwide calling, which under the old Bell System monopoly helped subsidize Time of Day Service.
