Co. Court studies utility district request

A petition holding 21 signatures was presented to Morrow County Court last Wednesday by a small delegation looking to get a proposed people's utility district on the May 21 election ballot.

The proposed PUD which would be called the Willow Creek People's Utility District, is currently being served by PP&L; the boundaries running from the Sherman County line along the Columbia River to include Arlington and then into Morrow County to Tower Road as the approximate point where the other boundary falls. According to the map included with the petition, only a small portion of Morrow County would be affected. It currently has two voters residing on it. The Morrow County land concerned now holds the PGE coal fire plant and a strip of Boeing property subleased by Simplot.

"We're not asking you to endorse the PUD, just to get it into the election to the voters," Robert Lucas, attorney representing the petitioners, told the court.

The commissioners told the delegation of three that no decision would be made until they had studied the petition fully. And even then, a public hearing would be required before the election.

"Basically all we want is to lower our electrical costs and before we can take this (the PUD) to the state, we have to put it before the voters," Dan Kutschkau, Gilliam County property owner, told the Gazette-Times.
