Eight members of the three south Morrow Garden Clubs recently met at the home of Fair Committee Chairman Jane Rawlins to work on preliminary planning for the 1985 county fair flower department.

They have reviewed the classifications for the Horticultural Specimen divisions and agreed on the titles and descriptions needed for the Artistic Arrangements divisions. They determined to have two entry classes this year: a Novice Class for persons who have never won a blue ribbon in arranging; and an Amateur Class to include persons who have already had experience exhibiting arrangements and who have previously won at least one blue ribbon with an arrangement.

The Novice Class is expected to include three divisions: (1) a triangular arrangement "Come To The Point"; (2) an arrangement using flowers, grasses, vegetables, and or fruits "From The Good Earth"; and (3) a table center piece which can be viewed equally well from every side "Diners' Delight". There will be about 15 named arrangements in the larger Amateur Class.

A special contest planned for this year's fair, a display of originally-created scarecrows, will give viewers a chance to vote for the scarecrow they find most appealing.
