

4-H poster program underway

Morrow County 4-H members can show their artistic talent by entering the 1985 4-H poster program.

The program was started in 1969 to give all interested 4-H'ers a chance to create posters illustrating what 4-H means to them. Young people may create their designs in any medium, from watercolor to crayon to collage.

This year, 4-H members may choose to develop a poster following one of three suggested themes or develop their own idea in the "open theme" category. Suggested themes are "4-H Investing in Tomorrow- Today," "4-H for Youth for America," and "Discover the World through 4-H."

All posters submitted in the pro-

gram must be 14 or 22 inches on, or affixed to standard poster board. Each poster should have a label showing the 4-H member's name and address and including a brief statement explaining the poster design.

"Each Oregon county may submit up to five posters in the state program," adds Mike Holroyd, Oregon State University Extension youth specialist who is coordinating the state program.

All posters will be displayed during 4-H Summer Week on OSU in June. Summer week delegates will vote and the three entries receiving the most votes will be forwarded to the national poster program and will be displayed during the 1985 National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

The national 4-H poster and theme is based upon entries shown in the national program, Holroyd explains.
