Rolling Hills Run shaping up for April 14

"Runners are you running? Walkers are you walking? ... cause the fourth annual Rolling Hills Run is just two weeks away and it's time to get in to shape," says coordinator Joy Krein.
 The run, which is on Sunday, April 14, at 1 p.m., starts at Heppner Elementary School, loops up and back along Heppner-Pilot Rock Highway, and finishes at Heppner City Park. Walkers and runners can choose from either a 5K (3.1 mile) or 10K (6.2 mile) distance.
 After the run, ribbons will be presented to the first three finishers in all age groups for both distances; additionally, carved wooden plaques will be awarded to the fastest male and female and to the oldest male and female participant. Also, during this time, all registered participants who have completed the race and turned in their tags and are present for the ribbon and plaque presentation will have a chance to win gift certificates or donated merchandise from Heppner merchants. These activities will be held in the multipurpose room at Heppner Elementary School.
 Late registration still continues and tee-shirts can be ordered but will not be available the day of the run. Registration forms can be found at the Shoe Box, Murray's, and Heppner Elementary School. The run is sponsored by the Morrow County Education Association with proceeds going to the Willow Creek Little League. Further information can be obtained by calling Liz Curtis at 676-9454.
