Reviewers are advised that the materials submitted may also affect other Goal topics in the jurisdiction's compliance request previously found by the Commission to be ready for acknowledgement. Comments or objections to the Commission acknowledging the plan must be submitted to the Department of Land Conservation and Development, 1175 Court Street N.E., Salem, Oregon 97310, by April 18, 1985 in order to be addressed in the staff report. A copy of the comment or objection letter should also be sent to the affected local jurisdiction.

Both teams went down in the first inning. Condon struck first, with two runs in the second inning off Pitcher Jim McConnell as Bill Caufield drove in two runs to take the early lead.

The Mustangs closed the gap to one, on Bob Riehl's RBI single. Then Heppner got it going in the third inning as they sent up eleven hitters in the third. Troy Hyatt and Riehl had two RBIs, and pitcher Chad Smith walked four hitters.

Eight runners came across the plate and Heppner led 9-1. Condon came close to coming back getting three runs in the third and added another in the sixth, but McConnell settled down after the

Heppner falls to 1-1 in pre-season game with Scio

The Heppner Mustangs record fell to 1-1 last Saturday as they lost to the Scio Loggers in a pre-season contest.

Scio, the class A champs two years ago looked impressive in the first two innings, taking a three nothing lead, thanks to a couple of errors and walks. But the Mustangs scored three runs of their own in the bottom half of the second.

Rick Riehl led off the inning with a walk, followed by brother Bob's single. Travis Hyatt lined a single to right field to score Rick. Following a wild pitch that scored Bob Riehl, Hyatt scored on a RBI ground out by Joe Taylor.

Heppner followed that inning with three more runs in the third. Singles by Ron Doherty and Troy Hyatt started the rally, followed by a throwing error on the third baseman and a walk by Bob Riehl. Travis Hyatt collected his second hit of the game and his third RBI to give Heppner the lead 6-3.

But that lead wasn't soon to hold as Scio registered two runs in the fifth and seven runs, (most of them unearned) to give the loggers a comfortable win.

Errors was the major problem of the Mustangs as they committed eight in the game. Pitcher Jim McConnell allowed only five hits in the game, striking out seven and walking nine. Scio committed only

third inning allowing only three hits.

"We didn't collect a lot of base hits but we were making contact and hitting the ball hard," said Coach Mike Royer, "we did get on base and score when we needed to and that's encouraging."

Condon out hit the Mustangs seven hits to four but also gave up five walks. McConnell struck out seven for Heppner.

"It's hard to evaluate this team after one game," said Royer, "but it's nice to start with a win and it gave us some much needed confidence."
