Students at Heppner Elementary School in Heppner are currently reading books in a effort to help Oregonians with physical disabilities.
 Students are participating in a Book-A-Thon sponsored by the Easter Seal Society of Oregon. Each participating student is signing up sponsors who will make pledges based upon the number of books the student reads during the Book-A-Thon. Pledges will go to the Easter Seal Society; all pledges are tax-deductible and more than 95 cents out of each donated dollar will stay in Oregon to help provide services to persons with physical limitations, reports Book-A-Thon coordinator Lisa Nelson.

This year's Oregon Book-A-Thon Chairman is Jamie Gilson, a popular children's author, "whose books keep kids laughing and reading." An autographed copy of her comical book about a fourth grade class at camp, "4 B Goes Wild" will be awarded each school which participates in the program. Winning schools will receive \$175 worth of William Morrow Junior Books for its library; students will be eligible for prizes ranging from Book-A-Thon cloisonne pins to a home computer for the state winner.
 The Book-A-Thon program is also designed to emphasize increasing awareness of the needs and problems of persons with physical disabilities, concluded Nelson.
