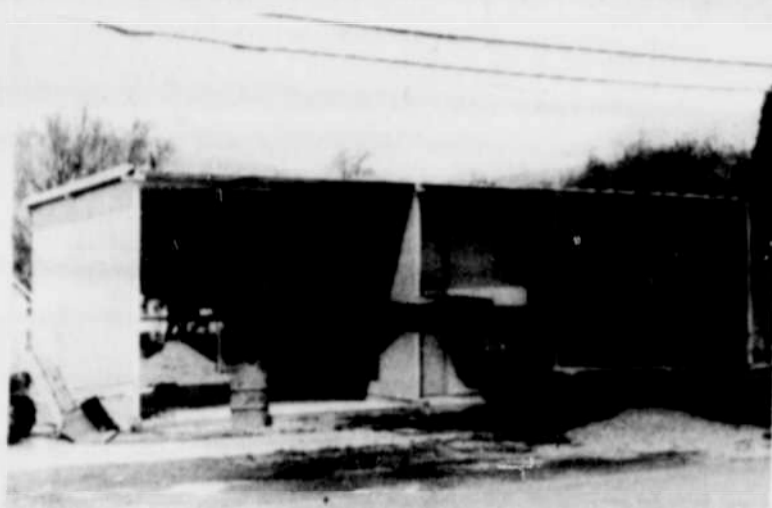


Car wash to open in Heppner



A June 1 opening has been scheduled for a self-service car wash on Center Street across from Heppner Auto Parts. Tom Riehl, the owner of the new business, said that he had "some extra space and decided to put the lot to use." The car wash was an acceptable use for the lot, which because of its location in the flood zone was restricted from some other uses.

The car wash will have two wand bays, says Riehl, with foaming

brushes for use by hand, engine degreasers, tire and wheel cleaners, hot water, soap, and hot wax. He expects to pick up the Hanna equipment, including a 3 1/2 horse power vacuum cleaner next week. He expects the "super fine" up-to-date equipment will "really do a good job."

The building, Riehl says, is 95 percent complete and barring any "unforeseen problems," the car wash should be able to open on schedule.

Left-hander Jerry Vandever was on the mound for Umatilla and the Mustangs happened to take an early lead in the first inning on an RBI single by Travis Hyatt.

But that lead didn't last long. Vandever and Joel Clucas had two hits and each drove in a run to give Umatilla a 2-1 lead.

The Vikings added another run in the second, one in the third, and two in each the fourth and sixth innings.

Heppner scored a run in the seventh inning on Dave Pedro's RBI single that scored Rick Riehl, who previously had hit his second double of the game.

Vandever gave up five hits and struck out eight. Troy Hyatt took the loss for the Mustangs.

The Mustangs fared better in the second game scoring three runs in the first. Jim McConnell and Loran Hayes singled, Hayes drove in two runs and Heppner led 3-0 after one.

Wildness over came McConnell in the second inning. Umatilla didn't collect a hit in the inning but there were four walks and an error. Umatilla scored four runs and that's all that they would need.

The Mustangs collected only two hits after the first inning off Carlson who struck out eight and walked two.

Hayes had two hits for Heppner.

"Buy a ticket-play the lottery...A winner every time." And so it goes. The New York Knicks have won the Patrick Ewing lottery, and must certainly be saving up their loose change for a few Lotto chances.

The NBA's first-ever draft lottery has produced (a) what the NBA fathers expected-a media hype for the draft process, (b) what they most certainly had hoped for-Patrick Ewing playing in the media capital of the world, and (c) a most unfair result for the league as a whole.

Imagine the Golden State Warriors plight for a moment. Unquestionably 1 and 1a with Indiana as the worst team in the NBA, the Warriors will likely get no more than a marginal blue-chipper in the draft. In making the seventh draft pick, the Warriors will be penalized for the mistakes of Indiana and Cleveland in making the NBA draft a farce.

For years, the league's weaker teams traded away their future for the shot at marginal prospects. Astute teams like Boston, Los Angeles and Dallas (and Portland) snapped up the first round picks. The result was a terrible imbalance of talent in the league. To add to the mockery, teams like Houston at least gave the impression that they were losing on purpose to try to corral successful prospects like Ralph Sampson.

To combat the "dumping" of games, and to increase the hype, the NBA came up with the lottery. As a result, the rich continue to get richer while the poor drop further off the pace. A TV commentator correctly noted that Golden State will probably (on merit) earn the league's worst record again next year. The irony is that even if the league reverts back to its old system, and the Warriors win the coin flip, there probably won't be much to choose from in the draft, now that the best underclassmen have turned pro. Such is life.

Baseball's season is starting to take shape a little, and the truest of the truisms will apply again this year-healthy teams win. The Mets were considered shoo-ins after last year's performance. Now, Daryl Strawberry has gone down for about two months. Another injury or two, and things could change dramatically in the pennant races. That's why, to answer the critics, major league baseball plays 162 games, and that's also why cheapening the regular season by expanding the playoffs would be a bad idea. Not that anybody at Major League Baseball cares what real fans think, anyway.

Prediction: Lakers in 5 games over Denver. Boston in 6. Then Lakers in 5. Playoff MVP: who else? Magic.
