

### Sheriff's Report

The Morrow County Sheriff's Office at the Morrow County Courthouse in Heppner has reported or dispatching the following business during the past week:

On May 4, the Boardman Police Department received a report of a burglary at a Boardman residence. Taken was a VCR.

Also on May 4, a Heppner Ambulance responded to a motor vehicle accident up Shobe Canyon near Heppner and transported two subjects to Pioneer Memorial Hospital. Oregon State Police, the Morrow County Sheriff's Office and the Heppner Police Dept. also responded.

#### Text of Petition

#### PETITION

To the Boards of Commissioners of Gilliam and Morrow Counties

We, registered voters of the affected district, desire to form a people's utility district (PUD) under Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 261 and request that an election be held on June 25, 1985, or sooner if possible, with the boundaries described below for formation of such a PUD. The name by which the district is to be known is:

#### WILLOW CREEK PEOPLE'S UTILITY DISTRICT

In addition, it is hereby proposed that the election should also include a request for the authorization of the PUD, if formed, to impose a special levy of \$100,000 to finance an engineer's report on revenue bonds for the acquisition or construction of the initial utility system, the revenue bond election under ORS 261.355 (5) and (6) and costs associated with them.

In the event the people within any

one or more municipalities or separate parcels of territory within the proposed district vote against its formation, then that portion of the district which voted in favor of organization of a PEOPLE'S UTILITY DISTRICT may be organized in the district.

The territory of the proposed WILLOW CREEK PEOPLE'S UTILITY DISTRICT is described as follows:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Gilliam County at a point on the boundary of the State of Oregon opposite the mouth of the John Day River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the John Day River to a point where it intersects the North line of Section 33, Township 2 North, Range 19 East; thence Easterly along section lines to the Southeast corner of Section 27, Township 2 North, Range 20 East; thence North-easterly to the Southwest corner of Section 13, Township 2 North, Range 21 East; thence Northerly along section lines to the Northwest corner of Section 6, Township 2 North, Range 22 East; thence Easterly along section lines to its intersection with center line of Oregon State Highway No. 74 (Willow Creek Road); thence generally Southeasterly along said center line of said highway to its intersection with the South line of Section 21, Township 2 North, Range 23 East; thence Easterly along section lines to the Southeast corner of Section 24, Township 2 North, Range 24 East; thence

Northerly along section lines to the Southeast corner of Section 13, Township 3 North, Range 24 East; thence Northwesterly to the Southwest corner of Section 20, township 4 North, Range 24 East; thence Northerly along section lines to the boundary of the state; thence Westerly along the boundary of the state to the point of beginning.

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County operating budget which includes: General Fund, Road Fund, County School Fund, Cities portion of Road Funds, Fair & Rodeo Fund, plus the Morrow County Hospital, and North Morrow Medical Clinic budgets for 1985-86. #### QUESTION

SHALL MORROW COUNTY LEVY A THREE YEAR SERIAL LEVY OF \$84,429 OUTSIDE THE TAX BASE FOR LIFEGUARD MEDICAL TRANSPORT?

#### PURPOSE

The purpose of this measure is to provide \$28,143 per year for three years for Lifeguard Medical Transport to help fund services to the citizens of Morrow County.

#### EXPLANATION

Lifeguard Medical Transport has requested that Morrow County contribute \$28,143 per year for three years to help fund their operations. Lifeguard Medical Transport is a private non-profit corporation that provides medical helicopter transport in an area of a 150 mile radius from Pendleton. Lifeguard is asking for assistance from approximately nine counties. The total three year serial levy is \$84,429 which includes six percent for taxes not expected to be received. The tax rate for Lifeguard Medical Transport will be approximately \$0.44 per \$1,000 valuation. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an estimate only based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of estimate for fiscal year 1985-86.
