\$19,000 damage estimated in Sunday fire

Three trucks and 13 men of the Heppner Fire Department responded to a house fire at the Norris Dooney residence on Highway 207 last Sunday afternoon. The fire was under control in 15 minutes. Fire Chief Forrest Burkenbine reported that every room in the house was affected by either fire, smoke or heat damage. Approx-

imately \$12,000 damage was estimated on the house and \$7,000 on the contents. Cause for the blaze is presently unknown, stated Burkenbine. The Dooney's were out of town when the fire broke out and did not return home until 9 p.m. Sunday, concluded Burkenbine.

Stephi prepares for state All-Star Basketball games



Stephanie Payne will begin practicing with 11 other All-Star players at North Douglas High School June 17. They will be coached by Mary Cant of Imbler and Bill Molendyck of Helix. Selected for the state Class "A" and "B" All-Star team during the state tournaments, Payne received a letter following the season with specifics about her stay with a host family in Drain during the week which will be capped with two east-west exhibition games. The

first one will be Friday, June 21, 7 p.m. at Lane Community College. A second game will follow at 8:45 Saturday, June 22 in The Dalles. Kinzua Corp has donated her \$50 uniform fee. Payne says that Fillies teammate Jodi Padberg who was also selected to play in the All-Star game will be unable to participate because she left for Spain on June 8 with a group of Heppner High School students. Payne says that practicing for the exhibition games will be "work because I have competed against some of the girls I will be playing with. But it will be fun, too. It will be different for all of us because we've never competed against teams from the western part of the state before except for the Fillies' game with Regis at the State Tournament."

The city park will be the hub of activities with organizations setting up food booths and an Art showing of local artists works. Games and contest will be conducted during the day for both adults and children at the park. The festivities will begin at 12 noon with a Kids and Kids-at-Heart Parade down Main street. At 12:30

First place finishers in each level contest also received award plaques and all participants received souvenir pencils and certificates. After the individual competition was completed, students were divided into groups of nine for a

team relay activity. Two teams composed of students from all county communities tied for first place in this event. Members of the winning teams also received award certificates for their winning performance. Contest co-chairman Mick Tolar and John Edmundson reported that the students showed a lot of intensity and interest in taking part in the annual math competition event. Krebs, McCawley transferred to Clackamas County

Richard Glenn McCawley pleaded guilty Monday afternoon to charges of Robbery I and Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle in Pendleton Circuit Court before Judge Olsen. Bail was set at \$100,000. Morrow County District Attorney Richard McNeerney reports that following McCawley's plea, his office dropped additional charges of Attempted Assault I, Assaulting a Public Safety Officer, Ex-Convict in Possession of a Firearm, Possession of a Firearm by an Inmate of a Penal Institution, and Burglary I. McCawley will return to Circuit Court in Morrow County July 11 for sentencing. McCawley and John W. Krebs were indicted by a Morrow County Grand Jury June 7 on identical charges stemming from the May 29 armed robbery of the Ione branch of the Bank of Eastern Oregon. Krebs was transported by the Oregon State Police from the scene

of the arrest at the junction of Juniper Canyon and Bombing Range roads, minutes following the robbery to the Umatilla County Jail. McCawley was transported by the Morrow County Sheriff's Office to the same jail. Morrow County Sheriff Roy Drago reports that Monday afternoon the Umatilla County Jail reached maximum capacity which necessitated moving Krebs and McCawley. The closest facility which could be found to house the Oregon State Penitentiary escapees was Clackamas County Jail. While in the Clackamas County facility, Morrow County will pay a \$48 per day fee which, Drago says, the county will no longer have to pay after the pair are transported to the State Pen on Wednesday, June 12. Krebs also will return to Morrow County Circuit Court on July 11 for further judicial action.
