Those placing first or second earned a trip to the state tennis meet at Roseburg on Friday, May 24 and Saturday, May 25.

He then won his second and third round matches. In the semifinal round, Meyers defeated Paul Reeder of Helix, 6-4, 7-5, earning a spot in the championship match. There he lost in straight sets to Stanfield's Oliver Bertschinger 6-1, 6-1. In a play-back to determine who would go to state, Meyers defeated Chris Rees of Helix 6-3, 6-4.

The doubles team of Mike Rietman and Ken Snider were also seeded third going into the Tournament and also placed second, earning a trip to state. They too had a first round bye and then won their second and third round matches. In the semifinals they topped Tracy Fields and Brian Robertson of Sherman County 2-6, 6-4, 6-2, to move

on to the finals. There, Rietman and Snider fell to another Sherman County's doubles team, this time Deron Caseburg and Bill Buchanan and lost 6-2, 6-1. However, they still advanced to state.

The Cardinals' other boys' singles player, Eric Pointer, won his first round match. However, he ran into Bertschinger in the second round and lost 6-1, 6-1.

Ione's number one girl's singles player, Paula Anderson, was defeated in the first round by Echo's Miss Davis. Also in the first round, Sabrina White lost to Echo's Jodi Cady.
