Pre-entry all that's required for state fair open class entries

Many Oregonians have a misconception about eligibility for exhibiting in the open class home ec divisions of state fair, falsely believing that exhibits chosen or selected to be entered at state, says Birdine Tullis, Oregon State University Extension Program Assistant for Morrow County.

This is not true; anyone proud of their work may enter by sending an entry form prior to August 2, listing items they wish to enter in open class. Junior open class divisions are being emphasized for the second year, with better premiums and

added categories. (Junior age is 18 or younger).

Anyone wishing to look through the open class home economics premium book will find one available at their local Extension Office, or they may obtain a copy of the premium book or more information by calling Jan Amling, Superintendent, Home Ec. Dept., at State Fair at 378-3247.

In addition to home ec depts., there are classes for photography, art, and many other special classes. All require pre-entry for exhibition.

Entering open class exhibits at state fair is a wonderful opportunity for all Oregon residents to share their skills with 750,000 goers, concludes Tullis.
