**May have to concede**

**turf to elephants**

Elephants on the island of Sumatra are mad and they're not going to take it anymore, reports a wildlife magazine. About a year after the government of Indonesia herded a group of elephants off to a preserve-making room for human settlers and agricultural expansion—herds of 50 or 60 elephants have begun daily rampages through their old grounds, terrorizing villagers, smashing homes and destroying crops. Traditional methods of dispersing the animals have failed. Authorities now admit they may eventually have to concede the turf to the persistent elephants.

The auction will take place on Wednesday, July 24, 1985, at the Holiday Inn-Portland Airport. It will begin at 9 a.m. and bidding will proceed tract by tract in the same sequence as the auction notice until all leases in all counties have been bid and/or closed by the auctioneer.

Oil and gas leases will be awarded to the qualified bidder who offers the greatest cash bonus bid. However, in the event a cash bonus bid is not offered, a lease may be awarded to the applicant for the minimum

required rental or, at the Division's option, any such parcel may be withdrawn until further notice. The successful bidder will be required to pay in full the application fee, bonus bid and the first year's rental of one dollar (\$1) per acre within five (5) working days after the close of auction. Company checks, but not sight drafts, will be accepted. Each lease issued shall be for a primary term of ten (10) years provided, however, that drilling must be commenced within six miles within seven years.

The Division reserves the right to withhold any tract or tracts and to reject any or all bids.

All leases offered are subject to the following:

1. Rights of surface owners for leases of reserved mineral rights.
2. Compliance with State laws and regulations thereunder.
3. Stipulations required by the State Forester to protect timberland, water quality and existing timber operations.

Declare independence from the heat this Fourth of July season by cooling off with tasty punch made with sparkling juices.

**BMCC Board approves budget**

The 1985-86 operating budget for Blue Mountain Community College was approved by the college board following a public hearing held June 19, says a BMCC news release.

The new budget stays within the tax base approved by voters last spring. Oregon law allows taxing districts to increase their levy amounts by six percent without requiring an election to approve the change.

Next year, the college will require just over \$3.3 million in property taxes to provide about the same quality and quantity of services currently available to district patrons in Umatilla and Morrow counties. One staff position was added to the budget, that of a mathematics-computer science instructor.

The owner of a \$60,000 home would pay \$87.60 to support the operation of the college next year, a total increase of about \$5.40 over this year. Money from property taxes fund just over half of the total operating revenue of the college.

In other monetary matters, the board adopted a resolution requesting the county treasurer turn over bond debt retirement taxes directly to the college as soon as collected. This will allow the college's business manager to invest those funds between the time of collection and the time the debt payment must be made.

Contracts were approved for two instructors at the college. Eugene Thoms, Helix mathematics instructor, was hired to fill the new mathematics-computer science opening. Eileen Theis, a nursing instructor from the Minnesota-Wisconsin area, will fill an opening in the nursing department caused by a staff resignation.

In other business, the board:

Approved an agreement with John Pickerd, electronic engineering technology instructor, whereby Pickerd will use college time, materials and students to develop an amplifier for use with public address systems. If Pickerd is successful in marketing the new device, the college will own 15 percent of the invention with Pickerd retaining an 85 percent interest. Lab projects, either real or hypothetical, are a normal part of the electronic engineering technology program, it was noted.

Elected George Anderson, Hermiston attorney, chairman of the board for next year. John Kopetski, Pendleton, will serve as vice-chairman.

Authorized the purchase of a satellite receiving dish for the college. The dish will pick up video conferences which can be offered to college patrons.

Set the board meeting calendar for next year. An October meeting in Athena is planned as well as an April meeting in Pilot Rock.
