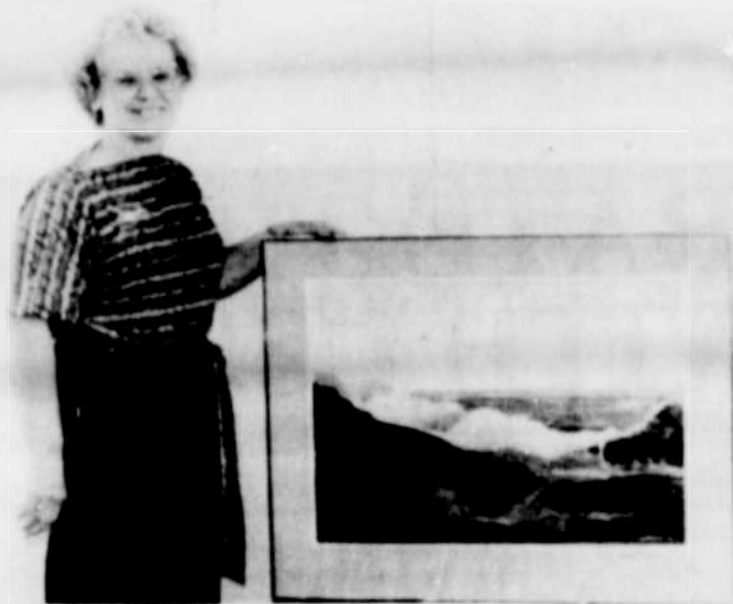


Watercolor artist conducts local workshop

Noted watercolor artist Peg Nickerson conducted a workshop at the Morrow County Fairgrounds Dorm Building Monday, July 1. Nickerson, the wife of former Heppner resident and cousin of Harry O'Donnell, Frances (Nick) Nickerson, made her stop at Heppner enroute to the coast from an elderhostel at Eastern Oregon State College where she had spent a week studying with artist Ian Gantley.

Seven local artists enrolled in the workshop to learn watercolor techniques, how to handle color, the brush, etc. Nickerson stressed

fundamentals with a basic approach of painting a light sky in the background and a dark landscape in the foreground to instruct her students.

Her realistic interpretations in water color have received numerous awards in competitions, have hung in juried shows in South Dakota, Iowa, and Texas, and have been purchased by banks, corporations, and private collectors of twelve states. Peg Nickerson paintings have been published in two different Bell Telephone Company calendars

that used work chosen by competition. She was a top winner of the 1980 S.D. Outdoor Art Contest and was included in the Women Artists Today traveling exhibit of 1979. In Texas she was presented three one-man shows since 1982.

Peg Nickerson's art training has included courses in drawing and painting from the Art Institute of Chicago, the University of Oregon, and the University of South Dakota. She studied for one year under Oscar Howe, late Artist Laureate of South Dakota, and has participated in workshops taught by Gene Dougherty, Bill Alexander, Herb Thomson, Chauncey Nelson, and Clay McGaughy.

She presents at least two different one-artist shows per year and teaches watercolor painting workshops regularly in Texas and South Dakota. Her work is displayed in Sioux Falls, S.D., by DCI Galleries; in Mitchell, S.D., by the Oscar Howe Art Center; and in Texas by the Main Book Shops of Fredericksburg and Kerrville, and the Hill Country Arts Foundation of Ingram.

Krebs enters guilty plea to Robbery I Charge

John W. Krebs, 35, Oregon State Penitentiary, entered a guilty plea at the Morrow County Courthouse Friday, June 28 on charges of Robbery I and Possession of a Firearm by an Inmate of Penal Institution. Charges of Attempted Assault, Assaulting a Public Safety Officer, Ex-Convict in Possession of a Firearm, Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and Burglary I were dropped reports Morrow County District Attorney, Richard McNeerney. The court set August 6 for sentencing following a presentence investigation, and received recommendations of a 25 year sentence with a mandatory minimum of 10 years.

In other business this past week, the District Attorney's office reports:

Bruce H. Young, 25, Heppner entered a change of plea June 25 to Guilty to Failure to Fall Trees Away from Class II Stream. charges of Failure to notify the State Forestry before commencing an operation and Failure to Provide Adequate Temporary Crossing on Class II Stream were dropped. He was sentenced to pay \$112 in fines and assessments.

Arraignment was set for July 10 for Arnulfo Rodriguez Ponce, 31, Boardman on a charge of Driving While Suspended.

D.A.'s Report

Arraignment was set for July 11 for Kathryn Marie Amburgy, 35, Irrigon, on a charge of Disorderly Conduct.

Judgement on Plea and sentence was handed down June 28 to Gary Douglas Green, 22, Pendleton, on a charge of Driving While Suspended, a felony. He was sentenced to one year bench probation with no further violations of the law and fined \$362.

Judgement on plea and sentence was handed down to Stephen Elliott Anderson, 37, Umatilla, on charges of Driving Under the Influence of

Intoxicants and Driving While Revoked, misdemeanors. He was ordered to pay a fine of \$577, receive Mental Health Treatment and his license was suspended for three years.

Donald Grubbs, 31, Umatilla, was sentenced June 28 to two years in the Oregon Corrections Division which was suspended to one year formal probation with special terms: Mental Health Treatment, and No Contact with Victim. He had been charged with Criminal Mistreatment I.

Patrick Verdell Erickson, 18, Irrigon was sentenced June 28 to five years in the Oregon Corrections Division formal probation, restitution of \$2,439.32, and a fine of \$550. He had been charged with two counts of Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

Jerry Michael Trill, 28, Salem, entered a plea of Not Guilty June 28 to two counts of Theft I.
