## Storage rate system amended

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's offer rate system for contracting grain storage space was amended recently to give the Commodity Credit Corporation the right to reject offers by warehouse operators when the handling rates exceed acceptable levels.

If a warehouse operator offers an excessive rate for either receiving or loading out, Judy Buschke, County Executive Director, said the CCC can reject the offer and terminate the storage contract, unless the operator subsequently submits acceptable rates.

"Under the offer rate system, warehouse operators are required to certify that they are not charging the government more than they would charge other customers," Buschke said. The acceptable ceiling for handling rates will be determined by using rates charged by other elevators in the area or region, she said.

When farmers take out commodity loans, their storage and handling charges can be deducted and forwarded directly to warehousemen. The storage and handling fees are then deducted from the principal loan, thus reducing the farmers interest costs. This should also allow warehousemen to offer lower storage rates for CCC-owned crops, Buschke said.

Only warehouse operators meeting the CCC's standards for approval may be contracted to store grain in which the Corporation has a vested interest. "CCC will make every effort to use warehouses with the most beneficial rates."

The ASCS official said all other conditions of the offer rate system will remain the same for the contract year beginning July 1, 1985.
