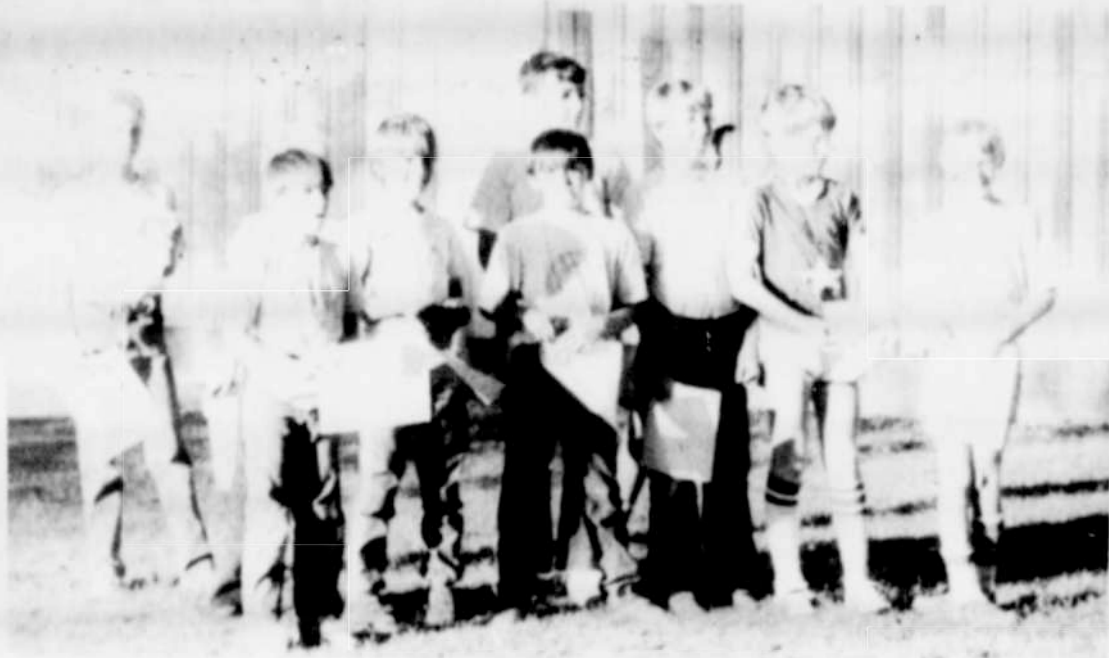


Cub Scouts complete day camp

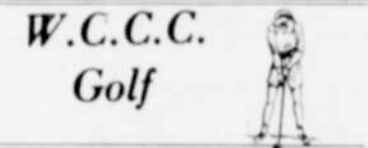

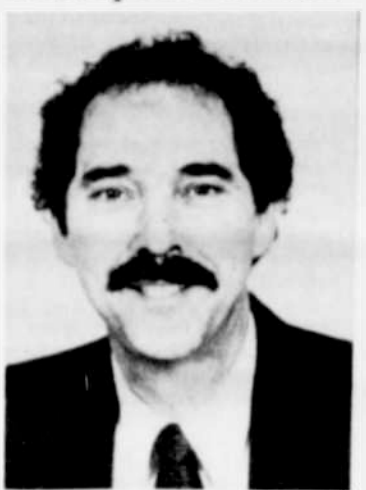
