## Deschutes Co. Commissioner makes pre-campaign swing thru Boardman

Chairman of the Deschutes County Board of Commissioners, Laurence A. Tuttle, has announced he will seek the Democratic nomination for second district congressman, now held by Republican Bob Smith.

On his theory of government, Tuttle, 39, says military spending is out of control, the federal deficit should be brought down, and the present congressman, Bob Smith, is not getting things done in Washington.

"We need to have a representative who can get things done and apply himself to getting the problems solved," says Tuttle, who points out that the federal deficit is hurting agriculture and timber in their ability to compete.

"If the deficit isn't brought under control then we need to design programs to help farmers and timber," he said.

He said he was disappointed with the Reagan Administration for not cutting the deficit, and then pulling the rug out from help to agriculture.

Tuttle also feels that military

spending is out of control, and that congress is not analyzing new defense systems on their merits.

Tuttle says that projections have shown that the economy will grow at four percent and that there is no evidence of that happening. "Our economic projections have been unrealistic."

Tuttle says proposed Federal user fees for use of the Columbia River shipping is not fair, and that he would oppose any changes in the user fees.

Tuttle was in Boardman on a pre-campaign trip, saying he plans to formally announce his candidacy at the end of September.

He lives in Redmond with his wife and two children, has lived in central Oregon over eight years and was educated from Medford High School.

Tuttle has been on the board of commissioners since 1982, and was elected chairman in 1985. He has worked mostly at a career in banking, finance, and consulting, includ-

ing finance manager for Oregon State Housing Division, (Housing Finance Agency) and as an organiz-

er and consultant to a state-chartered savings and loan association, (Northwest Savings and Loan Association) and as consultant to sponsors of federally subsidized housing developments and other federal and state loan program applicants.

## Four from Heppner and Ione attend Business Week

Faculty was selected on the basis of experience in day-to-day functions of business in the private sector.

Highlight of Business Week occurred Friday, Aug. 16, when all attending the business classes received a graduation certificate of achievement following a commencement address by Governor Victor Atiyeh.
