The various displays and the fine special demonstrations and contests which were presented during the fair week probably made this year's fair more interesting and more educational than fairs of past years. Again it was very disappointing, especially to young children, when the carnival which had been promised failed to arrive. The space that was to have been used as carnival space was later in the week opened for car parking, and the big problem of where people were to park and the need for the shuttle bus service was relieved somewhat.

Last week Jane Rawlins, her sister Jeannie Dobbs and I visited the big Oregon State Fair. We were pleased with the exhibits, with the garden displays and flower show and with the large Craft Village. We were proud of the good Morrow County centennial display which Harold and Edna Peck put in place just inside the east door of the Jackman-Long Building.

As we drove along the Columbia River, we stopped to spend a little time at the Columbia Gorge Hotel admiring its beautiful landscaping. How I dread having the fall freeze do away with the colorful flowers there and with most of our gardens, too. Fall is a pleasant season, but the death of the flowers depresses me.

On the bright side, we will soon be relieved of the need to get our lawns mowed each week and can turn our attention to other things instead of needing to be constantly watering outside.

Judging from the constant procession of pickups, trucks and trailers loaded with wood for burning in fireplaces and stoves that comes down Willow Creek, many families have planned ahead to keep warm next winter.

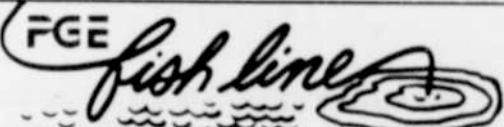

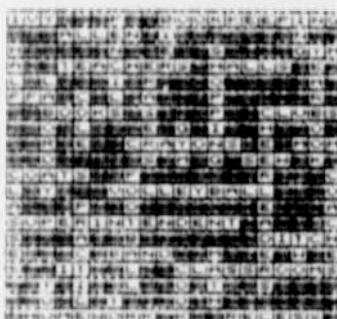

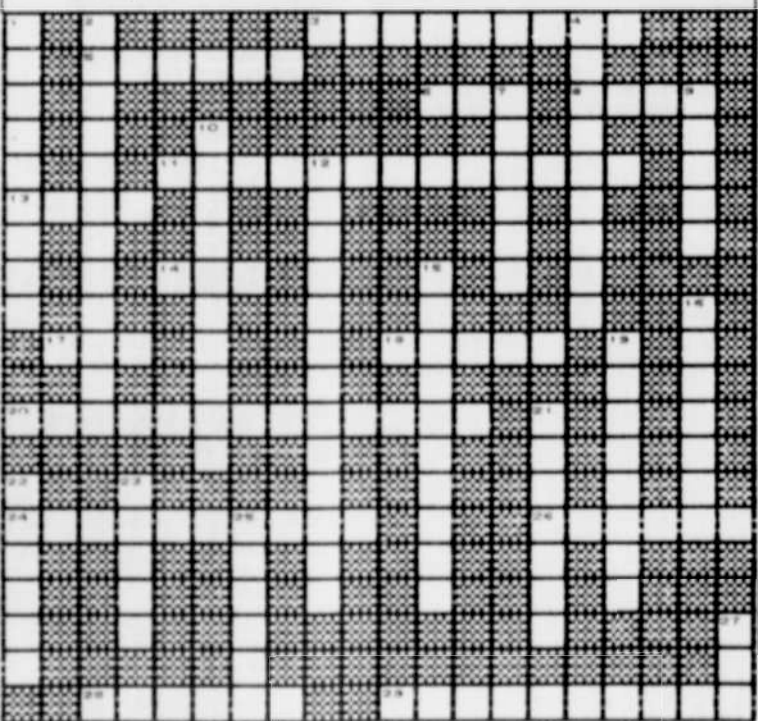
