The ghost town of Hardman in Morrow county received a four-paragraph one photo coverage in a recent issue of "Road Racer," subtitled America's first touring motorcycle magazine. The five page article by Bob Anderson lists Hardman first among such ghost towns as Columbia, California; Virginia City, Nevada; Tuscarora, Nevada; Belmont, Nevada; Elkhorn, Montana; Bodie, California; and Jerome, Arizona. The magazine which is published monthly by Aviation News Corp., Los Angeles, California, briefly mentions the origin of Hardman in 1860 as a convenient location for servicing local freight runs and its demise near the turn of the century with the advent of the railroad in Eastern Oregon.
