

Fillies take 1st in Wahtonka Tourney

The Heppner Fillies varsity volleyball team remains undefeated after this weekend's Wahtonka Tournament. The tournament was held at The Dalles carrying six teams: Heppner, Condon, Stanfield, Hood River, Wahtonka, and Goldendale, Washington.

The tournament was played in a different manner. Instead of playing complete matches, each team played one game against the other five teams. The winner was determined by the best record.

The Fillies' first game was against the Stanfield Tigers. Heppner fell behind quickly 4-11, but after a time-out the Fillies got it together and made a strong come back. The

final score against the Tigers was Heppner 15 and Stanfield 13.

"Our first win against Stanfield was very intense and I believe that this Heppner team's major asset is its ability to concentrate throughout the entire game," said coach Julie Reynolds, "this concentration aided the 4-11 come back."

The Fillies second game was against Goldendale. Goldendale's definite advantage was their height. But the Fillies showed them that even the shorter teams can spike the ball. After beating Goldendale, the Fillies went on to play Wahtonka. Another win set them up with Hood River.

This game, the Fillies figured would be their toughest out of the five. After an excellent spike, floater Cindy Stroeber, landed wrong on her ankle, which put her out for the rest of the day. Unfortunately, not only for the day but until further notice.

Continuing in the game, Heppner pulled ahead 8-1 but Hood River made a come back. The score was 11-10 and Heppner took a time-out. Back to the game, the Fillies scored their final four to take the game.

At this point the Heppner Fillies were 4-0 and the Condon Blue Devils were 4-1. The final game of the tournament was Heppner against Condon. This would decide the "champions."

The game against Condon started fairly even. As the game progressed the Fillies did too. At 7-4, Heppner's favor, the Fillies scored their final

eight points in a row. The game ended with a bang. Heppner made the serve Condon returned the ball and the Fillies completed a five-one offense, with a good hard spike down on the other side of the court.

The scores to Heppner's games were Stanfield 15-13, Goldendale 15-8, Wahtonka 15-12, Hood River 15-10 and Condon 15-4.

"Overall play was excellent. I attribute two of our wins to just being in better physical shape," commented Coach Reynolds, "we still need work on consistent service from all our team members," she added.

Heppner took over six varsity players Turner, Gates, Eubanks, Conners, L. Reid and D. Reid, one floater Stroeber, and one JV player, Tareena Nash, all of whom contributed to the effort. Also one varsity player, K. Murray, who was ineligible because of illness, dressed down in case of any injuries.

Condon tied for second place with Hood River but because Condon had higher point totals they went home with second place and Hood River took third. Fourth place went to Wahtonka, Stanfield was fifth and Goldendale finished sixth.

The Fillies will play the Weston-McEwen Tigerscots Thursday, Sept. 19 and the Pilot Rock Rockets Tuesday, Sept. 24. Both games are at home beginning at 5 p.m.

JVs take season opener 8-0

Heppner's junior varsity football team won their opening game of the season at the expense of the Stanfield Tigers by an 8 to 0 tally on Monday, Sept. 9.

The Mustangs jumped out two to nothing in the initial period when Scott Davis and Barney Lindsay tackled a Tiger ball carrier in Stanfield's end zone for a safety.

Heppner increased their advantage in the second quarter when Mark Fishburn returned an interception 50 yards for a touchdown. Heppner's lead was 8-0.

Most of the second quarter and all of the second half was played in a pouring rain. Each team turned the ball over several times as a result.

Running back Scott Jones was the workhorse of the Mustang offense. Jones had a 60 yard touchdown run called back on a penalty and gained numerous other yards, mostly on second effort.

"We had a lot of good moments in the game. Defensively we played really well. Stanfield never threatened to score. The whole defense played real well as a unit," stated JV Mustang coach Les Payne.

Coach Lee Block agreed, "We played real well despite the rain." Heppner's next JV game will be at Athena on Monday, Sept. 23, where they will take on the Weston-McEwen TigerScots. The contest

will begin at 5 p.m.

Defense was the big story of the game. Heppner had 34 yards rushing and 42 yards passing for only eight yards of total offense. Riverside managed 90 yards on the ground and 58 yards in the air for a total of 148 yards.

Alex Lindsay and Buschke led the Mustangs rushing attack. Lindsay carried the ball 14 times for 39 yards and Buschke picked up 23 yards on four rushes.

Ramirez and Griffin were responsible for the majority of Riverside's offense. Ramirez gained 62 yards on 17 attempts, while Griffin packed the ball ten times for 37 yards. Griffin also completed 5 of 14 passes for 58 yards. He also returned four punts for 67 yards.

Due to the slippery conditions, each team had six fumbles. Heppner lost one and Riverside two. Defensively, Bob Riehl had 17 tackles and Chris McLaughlin had 16. McLaughlin had 26 defensive points, Riehl 18 and Buschke 12.

"We made too many mistakes. We hurt ourselves all night, remarked head coach Tim Birkby. Heppner hosts the Weston-McEwen TigerScots at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 20. The TigerScots are 2-0 and tied for first in the Columbia Basin Conference.
