Wheeler scored first, however, only three plays and less than two minutes into the game. Mark White ran three yards for the score and ran in the extra point conversion to give Wheeler an 8-0 lead.

Ione came right back with Kevin Ball throwing a one yard touchdown pass to Eric Pointer. Ball then turned around and passed to Chris Rea for the extra points leaving Ione tied with Wheeler 8-8.

Wheeler scored next when the Falcons John Anderson grabbed the ball from Kevin Ball and ran 70 yards for a touchdown.

Ione scored first in the second quarter when Ken Snider made one of his four touchdown runs of the night. Rea again caught a pass from Ball to put the Cardinals on top 16-14.

Wheeler scored, though, on their next possession to retain the lead 20-16. Then with less than a minute to play in the half, Snider scored his second touchdown, another one yard run, and then passed to Rea for the extra point conversion and Ione went into the locker room with a 24-20 lead.

The third quarter was all Ione as

the Cardinals scored 14 points on two runs and a conversion run of three yards, all by Ken Snider. The Ione defense meanwhile didn't allow Wheeler any yards at all.

Ione again dominated the fourth quarter. Mike Scalf caught a 27 yard pass and his brother John ran 25 yards for another score, giving the Cardinals a 50-20 lead halfway through the fourth quarter. Wheeler managed a final score as Mark White ran 40 yards to bring Wheeler to 24. John Scalf closed out the scoring for both teams with a six-yard run, making the final 56-26 in the Cardinals' favor.

Ione had 284 yards in total offense lead by Snider's 200 total yards and four touchdowns. Snider also made 11 tackles on defense and for his efforts was named by coaches Kip Norris and Del LaRue the player of the game.

The Cardinals travel to Dufur on Friday, Sept. 27 to take on the Rangers at 1:30 p.m.

Do you have pennant fever yet? If not, this baseball season may still have enough excitement left to make us all forget about two-day strikes and cocaine trials.

In the NL East, the Mets have fallen three back (at this writing) but you certainly can't lay the blame at the feet of Mr. Dwight Gooden. It's really scary to think of the things Dr. K is going to do in his career, presuming good health. In the NL West, the Reds have tried to make things interesting, but it may still be too little, too late. The Dodgers have been carried by Pedro Guerrero all year, and he's now hurt. Behind all the Pete Rose-Ty Cobb hoopla, the Reds have played very well. Dave Parker has had an MVP year, while rookie Tom Browning has won 18 games.

In the AL, the Blue Jays have apparently salted things away. They took New York's best shot and held tough. Things are back to normal in the Big Apple-I see where Billy Martin broke up a fight and his arm in a barroom scuffle. And so it goes.

In the AL West, it's still a dead heat. Reggie Jackson fan or not, wouldn't you like to see Mr. October in the Series one more time? I would. Rod Carew in the Series for the first time would be some justice, also. KC is hanging tough, however, led by George Brett and young Bret Saberhagen. It's still too close to call there.

One other baseball note-Wade Boggs of Boston has his average up to .374. In an era when .300 lifetime hitters are very rare, Mr. Boggs has posted a .500 mark for his first four years. Wow.

One other note: A big "attaboy" to Tim Birkby and the Heppner Mustangs for their first win-6-0 over Weston-McEwen. It was a well-deserved win for the young Mustangs.

I've been asked by a local sports fan whether I think Pete Rose will get the same treatment that Roger Maris got when he broke Babe Ruth's 60-homer record. You'll recall that Maris' record was treated with disdain by the media, and that Major League Baseball put an asterisk next to the record, claiming Maris had 8 more games to play in than did Ruth.

I don't believe that Rose will get that treatment, for several reasons. I think the media approach to such records has changed since 1961; Babe Ruth was the symbol of all-time Americana; Ty Cobb was not, Rightly or wrongly, there is less of a feeling of "fluke" toward Rose than there is toward Maris. These are all small factors, but the greatest is this: Pete Rose is a favorite of the media, always has time for an interview. Maris was unfairly penalized because he didn't spend all his spare time answering the same questions a million times. It's unfortunate but true: the cooperative players get most of the good press.

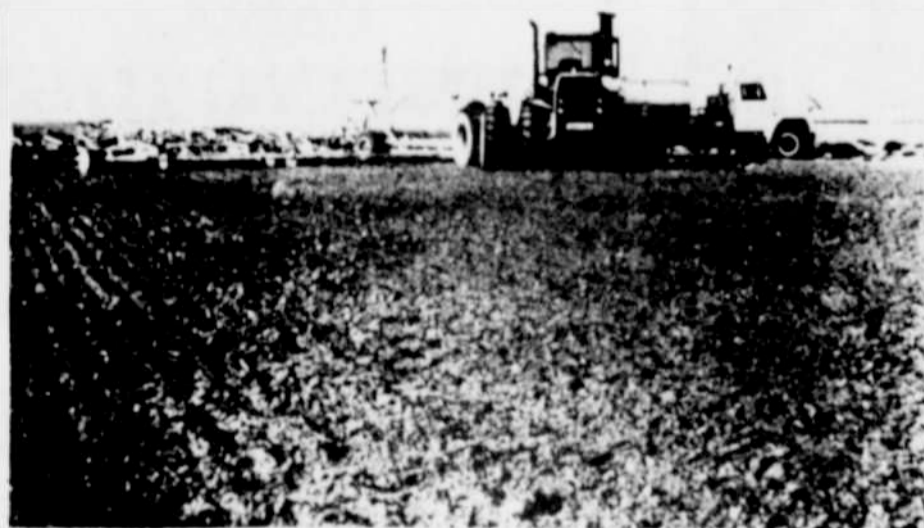
George and Dale moved into the early lead, while Mike seems to follow his heroes, the Bengals (get it?).
