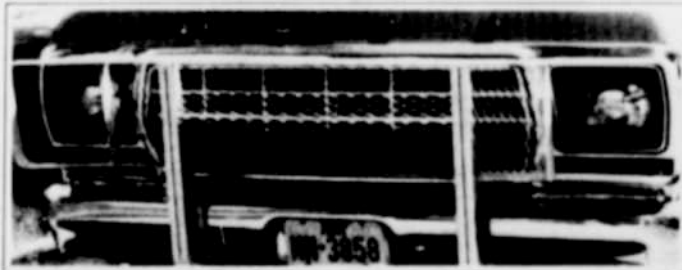

French to run for re-election

representative has been quite successful and with his added experience he can be even more effective in the next session.

A news release from French's office says that he feels the legislature will have an even bigger job in the next session. With the overwhelming defeat of the sales tax measure tax reform will be a high priority item. French did not support the sales tax package because he felt this was going to be an additional tax and not the tax reform the people of the state of Oregon want.

"State government must become more efficient in its spending habits as well as be prepared to make budget cuts until the economy turns upward and generates more wealth which in turn will provide more tax revenue to fund state programs," he said.

French also feels his experience in the legislature will be valuable in the next session in areas of unresolved issues affecting Eastern and central Oregon. Among these, in addition to tax reform, are water policy issues, land use planning, economic development, promotion of tourism, and distribution of lottery funds.

Representative Roy French announced that he will be a candidate for re-election for the office of State Representative for District 59. Elected in November, 1984, French says his first term as state

Claudia Hughes, Heppner, will be among nine women traveling from Umatilla and Morrow counties to attend a leadership training session on the Oregon Coast. Sponsored by the Oregon State University Extension Family Community Leadership Program, it is being held at the

Agate Beach Hilton in Newport, October 7-10. Expenses of the program are paid by a grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation.

The Umatilla Morrow group consists of volunteers and Extension staff.

The three-day institute will concentrate on communication skills, public policy education, group process, and teaching others. Nearly 80 trainers from 11 Oregon counties will be working together during the institute.

"The goal of the institute is to help participants become more effective in dealing with local public issues," said Greg Tillson, state coordinator of the Oregon program.
