Renaming Rajneesh won't cure problems

To the Editor:
Renaming Rajneesh its original name of Antelope does not cure the problems. As long as the Rajneeshes control the city, we will still have constant police "protection" (6 officers for 115 residents-the highest ratio in the State) and outrageous city taxes (at approximately \$20 per \$1,000, also the highest in the State). Only disincorporation of the city will stop the abuses. We've asked the Rajneesh City Council to voluntarily disincorporate, but they've refused.
We thank Oregonians for their

generous financial and emotional support with the petition to repeal Rajneesh's city charter. But there is still a long way to go. We continue to need money for printing and postage. We need help circulating petitions. We need everyone's signature on a petition. If we have 100,000 signatures by July 3, 1986, the petition will be on the November, 1986 ballot.
Only after Rajneesh's city charter repeal will Antelope really be Antelope again.

50 Years Ago
Sunrise Sunday morning will be the signal for opening fire on Chinese pheasants, Hungarian partridge and quail in Morrow County if a prevalent rumor that the season will be closed does not materialize. Rumor has it that pheasants in this district have been much depleted by a malady that has had fatal effect on many, dissection of dead birds revealing a wormy condition and that the game commission is considering closing the season on that account.
The most significant changes in the agriculture of Morrow County in the last five years have been a reduction of 20 percent in wheat acreage, an increase of 25 percent in hay acreage, and a gain of 53 percent in the number of cattle, according to a preliminary report of the 1935 census of agriculture released today by Director William L. Austin, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce.

Freida Dorothy Savitts, Troutdale died in Gresham on September 28, 1985 at the age of 76 years.
She was born in Norika, Russia on August 15, 1909. In 1912 she moved from Russia to Portland, where she attended school. She attended Portland Public Schools in the Albina area.
On December 31, 1927 in Portland, she married John Savitts. For about 10 years from 1973 to 1984 she lived on the Blake Ranch near Heppner.
While in Portland and until her retirement she had worked as a seamstress for the Hersh Weiss Co., in the canvas products division. She was also a pianist and loved to play her piano.

Clarence E. Linn

Graveside services were held for Clarence E. Linn, a former lone resident on Wednesday, Sept. 25 at Willamette National Cemetery in Portland. He died at Sunny View Care Center in Portland on Saturday, Sept. 21 after a prolonged illness.
Born September 6, 1906 in Brown County, Ohio, he was the son of Peter J. and Grace (O'Connor) Linn. The family came to lone in 1913. As a young man he lived and worked in lone. He was a member of the lone baseball team and also played in a local band.
After serving with the Army during World War II, he was employed by the Oregon State Employment Service in Corvallis, Lebanon, La Grande, and Oregon City. Retiring in 1971, he lived in Oregon City. He was an avid golfer and bowler.
On Nov. 29, 1941 Linn was married to Marguerite Goulet. She preceded him in death in April, 1955.

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
