

Vikings spoil Mustang Homecoming

Umatilla's Vikings handed the Mustangs a 20-8 Homecoming defeat on Friday, Oct. 4.

Both teams were held scoreless in the opening quarter. Early in the second quarter, Rafael Ochoa ran in from 14 yards out. Steve Pankey ran in the extra points, as Umatilla led 8-0.

Later in the second quarter, Joe Taylor hooked up with Tony Clement for a 36-yard pass play, putting Heppner at the Viking 10-yard line. On the next play, Alex Lindsay dashed into the end zone. Todd Lindsay threw to David Pedro as Heppner tied the score at eight.

Neither team managed to score in the third period. Umatilla drove inside the Mustang 20-yard line, but Bob Riehl recovered a Ramiro Garcia fumble, to end the Viking threat.

The Vikings added two touchdowns to pull out the game in the fourth quarter. On the first play of the quarter, Russell Richards hooked up with Pankey from 14 yards out. With under two minutes to play,

Garcia sprinted 18 yards to put the game on ice.

"We had some lapses throughout the game and we need to correct them," stated head coach Tim Birkby.

Heppner travels to The Dalles on Thursday, Oct. 10 to play the Wah-tonka Eagles at 7:30 p.m.
