The whole yard is well-groomed with not a weed in sight. Evergreen shrubs follow the lot line on the east end of the yard.

A healthy six-foot pine tree planted in the front of the house was a seedling awarded by the Lone Garden Club to their granddaughter, Heather Kandle, for a first award in the Smokey Bear, Woodsey Owl Poster Contest five and a half years ago, when she was in the first grade. At that time the Kandle family was

not certain where they would live so Heather asked her grandparents' permission to plant it in their yard. She carefully attended to it and has watched it grow into this beautiful tree.
