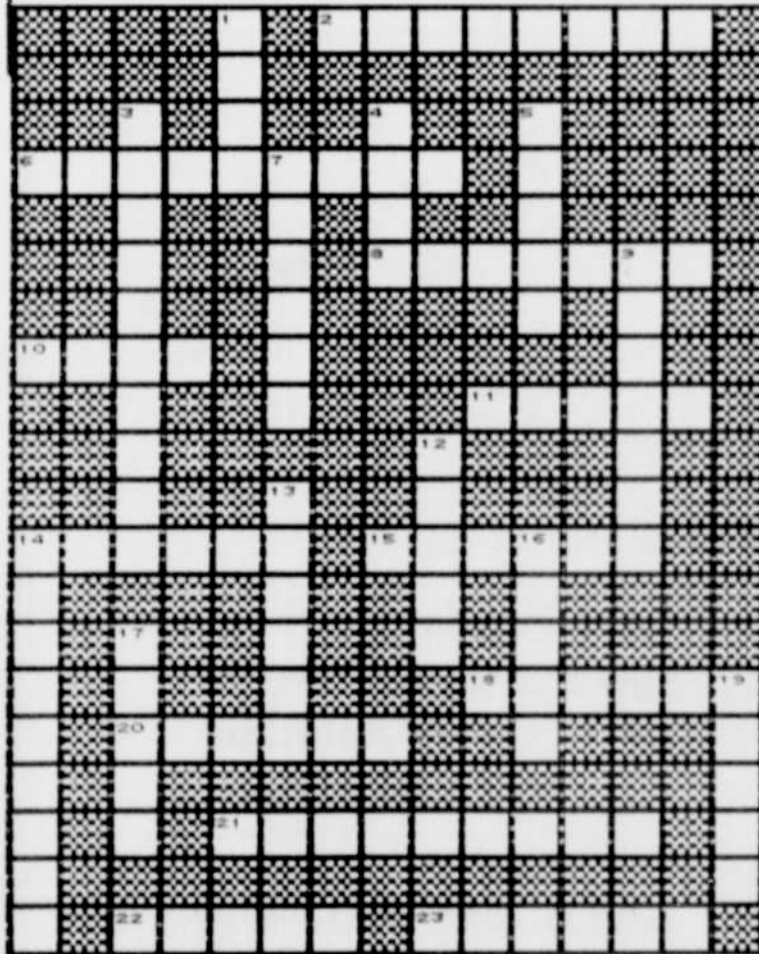

CBEC board approves hiring consulting engineer Bell donated to city

At a Thursday, October 24 meeting, the Columbia Basin Electric Co-op board of directors, approved hiring the consulting engineer Rex D. Brown of Vancouver, Washington. As consulting engineer, Brown will make recommendations for improvement in the Columbia Basin system and inspect and approve the work when it is completed. Co-op Manager Fred Toombs reports that some of the co-op's transmission

equipment needs to be replaced and Brown will be in charge of the project.

The board also approved the audit report and affirmed an excellent year of operation. Although a large investment was made in the plant, Toombs said that the co-op was able to meet the Rural Electrification association mortgage payment satisfactorily without borrowing.

New forage growth scatters elk

Roosevelt Elk are widely scattered due to the new green forage growth from recent rains and warm weather, said Glen Ward of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. He anticipates that 60 percent of the Elk hunters will opt for the first season October 30 to November 3, and that only about 40 percent will hunt the November 9-17

season. The elk population is stable compared to last year, he said, but since most branch antler bulls were harvested last year, hunters can expect to bag mostly yearlings this year.

Hunting conditions should improve with snow, Ward concludes the best chances will be in thickets lacking roads.
